



To ensure the rescuer's safety, responding firefighters determined the best course of action was to climb the tree and cut the branch the bird was attached to, and by doing so, the bird would land below in water where personnel could free it from the branch.

SWFD Lieutenant Firefighter/Paramedic Chris Powell then climbed the tree using a harness and rope rescue equipment. Powell secured himself to the tree at each point when making cuts to the branches using a reciprocating saw.

After approximately 25 minutes of work from responding firefighters, the branch and bird were cut free and fell safely into the water below. Alaqua Animal Refuge personnel entered the water and successfully retrieved the bird by cutting it free from the fishing line.

According to Alaqua's medical evaluation, the pelican did not suffer any fractures, however had soft tissue trauma from a deeply embedded fishing hook in one of its wings. Their staff removed the hook, then cleaned and wrapped the affected area. Alaqua staff report the bird should recover from the incident in approximately a week's time with the help of antibiotics and pain medication.

Alaqua Animal Refuge and SWFD want to remind the public that it is the start of migration season for these birds and many incidents involving wildlife in distress can be avoided by the proper disposal of hooks, lines, and other fishing materials.

Since 2014 they have abolished over 7 billion dollars in medical debt across the country.

Every dollar raised eliminates \$100 in medical debt for people in deep need. It is the goal of the Democratic Women of Walton County to raise \$5,000 to alleviate \$500,000 in medical debt for eligible individuals in Northwest Florida.

Former U.S. Treasury Sec-

retary James Baker commented some time ago that one of the greatest challenges to the union is that America is seen through our current account deficits and. even more importantly, the debt to GDP ratio. That ratio is at its highest level since the end of World War II. He argued that that is unsustainable. It eventually will significantly erode the standards of living for any country, let alone our own. A country can either significantly cut spending (along with other austerity measures), raise taxes or default on its debt. None of these are in the best interest of the country and none are politically, economically or socially acceptable. The answer, just as it was after WWII, is for the U.S. to inflate its way out of that ratio. In other words, let the dollar continue to inflate. That is not saying, however, that the current levels of inflation are acceptable or the answer.

#### The Fed's Two-Tiered Mandates

The Federal Reserve is not shy about communicating its double mandate of a target of low inflation – they state 2 percent and full employment. Most consider full employment to be an unemployment rate of 4 percent. We are currently at approximately 3.5 percent unemployment, with a severe labor shortage and two job openings for every one person looking for a job. Inflation, by way of CPI is at 8.3 percent.

#### The Fed's Target Inflation Rate is with PCEPI not CPI

Most of the media report inflation from the US Labor Department's monthly reading known as the Consumer Price Index or CPI. It is consumer driven, is only from urban areas and gives its largest weighting

to housing (or shelter). Investors should take note that the Fed uses the Personal Consumption Expenditures Price Index or PCEPI as its measure of inflation. This is important for investors because PCEPI is 6.1 percent and CPI is 8.3 percent at this writing. The Fed is somewhat closer to its target by way of PCEPI. The PCEPI gives a lower weighting to housing and is from a broader spectrum including producers and non-profits. The Fed feels it is a better indicator of inflation since it was introduced in 2012 (and is from the US Department of Commerce).

### What About the Unemployment Rate

Fidelity Investments recently commented that for inflation to come down, unemployment would have to go up as high as 6.5 percent for the Fed to get to its inflation target. That is because this historically low unemployment is driving wages higher at an accelerating rate, thus driving inflation. The question is whether politicians and society would accept that. The answer is probably not. Add to that you see that higher rates of employment (because of fewer dollars in the economy) might release more stimulus with unemployment assistance. The more things change the more they stay the same.

#### The Impact This Has on Interest Rates and Yields

So, the Fed has tried to reduce inflation by raising short term rates, known as the Federal Funds rate to a new target of 3-3.25 percent. It has also begun to let those Treasury bonds (and Mortgage-Backed Securities) it bought during the pandemic mature (hence reducing the supply of money or liquidity out there). The immediate impact of this will be 1) U.S. banks increase what they earn on overnight deposits with the Fed or other banks and might therefore lend less (an intended outcome) 2) U.S. banks have an increased source of revenue (making the financial sector more valuable in our opinion) 3) Money Market Mutual Fund yields should continue to climb 4) CD yields, mainly shorter term, should continue to climb 5) the domino effect is felt in the Treasury market and ultimately mortgage rates 6) the economy should continue to slow. Risk averse investors can avoid market volatility by moving in to or accumulating assets in the cash equivalent type investments. One caveat: Take caution as to the real rate of return with inflation currently reading as high as it is. More risky assets such as stocks and real estate continue to be (despite their current volatility and price woes) the leaders in outpacing inflation and with the real rate of return.

#### Is it Different This Time?

We have quoted before the words of the great investor, Sir John Templeton. He suggested that investors take note of the four most expensive words in investing; "This time it's different." Reading the news and listening to the commentators, most investors are finding themselves tested and somehow believing that this time it is different. Peter Lynch (another great investor) often called that "background noise." We don't think this time is different. We look to history as a greater indicator of where things are and where they are likely to be in the long run. The economy is slowing, earnings are coming down. Stocks follow earnings. There is a winter coming or it has arrived. But spring will come again, and no one knows exactly when that will be, so best to be positioned for recovery vs. trying to time it (which is close to impossible). Some people get frustrated when they constantly hear it best to hold or wait and not give up hope at the worst possible time. We also take note that if you want to build your health you have to be consistent and respect diet and exercise. If you want to build your wealth, you must be consistent with buying and holding and or reallocating when necessary. We remind investors however that not one size fits all: Goals, Risk Tolerance (comfort level) are always the most important.

#### Our Current Thinking and Suggestions for Investors

The U.S. dollar will start to come down as foreign central banks will begin to sell their holdings of U.S. dollars. Japan has already begun doing this. The U.S. dollar, at this writing is at decades high and is up 16 percent ytd. That hurts other economies and the earnings of many US companies who are multinational (many of America's largest companies get revenues from overseas and their products and services are much more costly with a higher dollar hence hurting their earnings).

A cheaper dollar could mean stronger returns in emerging markets and with other currencies. Investors can buy mutual funds that invest in both and buy the individual securities. This is more speculative however, so caution is urged.

Inflation will continue to moderate. The Fed will coordinate further rate hikes with respect to PCEPI, not CPI.

Unemployment will rise, which will further reduce upward pressure on interest rates.

There is value with municipal bond yields and rates. The swift move in rates is producing yields, and we think values, not seen in more than 10 years. Investors in higher tax brackets could benefit by locking in these higher tax-free yields. Add to that most states are in strong financial shape and running surpluses.

The demand for housing (40 percent of the CPI and close to 20 percent of the PCEPI) will remain resilient but the opportunity to buy a home will remain muted with higher mortgage rates. Many would-be home buyers are forced to rent since they cannot afford to buy at these rates, keeping rents higher. Fewer new housing units are being built keeping some of that pressure on. Commercial real estate (office space) which is overbuilt could see some relief if landlords see opportunity in converting office space into condos and apartments to meet that demand. Real estate income investments or funds could provide attractive opportunities for suitable investors.

War, cyber warfare, cybersecurity and raised uncertainty with China: The Early Warning Report, in its August edition, continues to highlight the large defense and cybersecurity stocks for the foreseeable future.

Demographic trends: Will huge countries such as China reverse their population growth? Author Peter Zeina in his book "The End of The World is Just the Beginning" ponders this. That could have implications in the next few decades for demand, inflation and interest rates.

Health Care – surprisingly, inflation for health care costs has not been at the rate of PCEPI

or CPI. The labor shortage is even more intense in this sector (37,000 fewer nurses than before the pandemic began). We think that economic environments such as this warrant an increased exposure to health care stocks or funds.

Power, or electricity consumption along with shortages, will continue to grow substantially. The world continues to grow its affluence and its standard of living. That means greater demand for power. Data centers (think the cloud), EVs, cleaner water and sanitation for the world, greater indoor climate control et al continue to drive that up. This has implications for continued fossil fuel demand (and hence the energy sector) as well as renewed demand for nuclear energy and companies that operate nuclear facilities. Oil prices will remain at \$80-90 per barrel and hence continued strong earnings for oil companies. We think there will be a renewed emphasis on nuclear technology and construction. Expanded demand is also seen for natural gas and even coal for the foreseeable future. Wind and solar will continue to grow but so will the challenges (and opportunities) for the rare earth materials needed to build them.

Artificial intelligence and robotics technology and production will accelerate. This is one innovation that has accelerated due to labor shortages and higher labor costs. Those are the areas that technology companies can grow and expand and increase their earnings. Selfdriving EVs and trucks still need to refine their programming but are coming faster than originally thought.

Lastly, the market is doing a lot of the Fed's work and that is bringing asset prices, earnings, and ultimately inflation down. We are in or entering recession and yields will soon peak and by late 2023 will start to come down. Investors should always be cautious and prudent to not get overly influenced by the media-driven anxiety. Long term, buy and hold and patient investors have typically fared the best.



### Cultural Arts Alliance Adds Native Plantings, Wildflowers to Watersound Monarch Art Trail

To be Unveiled During 30th Annual Flutterby Festival Weekend

The Cultural Arts Alliance of Walton County (CAA) announces that improvements were recently made to the Watersound® Monarch Art Trail (WMAT), a program of the CAA's Art in Public Spaces (AIPS) program featuring eight original sculptures installed along South Watersound Parkway's existing mile-long walking and bike path.

The CAA partnered with Sandhills Native Nursery to clear existing plant beds, install native pollinators, including Blue Sage, Lantana, Seaside Goldenrod, Milkweed, Silk Grass, Skullcap, and dozens more around each of the eight sculptures; and spread wildflower seeds along the forest's tree line. Around 60 volunteers, including students from the Abadie Academy, Magnet Innovation Center (STEAM) and Westonwood Ranch worked to clear and install the ecologically sustainable gardens over the course of two days. Additionally, custom benches created by local craftsman Jim Foley and updated solar powered lighting will be installed this month.

"This phase of the Watersound® Monarch Art Trail improvement is focused on sustainability and providing the public with continuous enjoyment of the artwork and native plantings," said CAA Executive Director Jennifer Steele. "We are fortunate to have found a partner in Sam Mello of Sandhills Native Nursery who designed the garden beds to withstand longer periods of dry weather, enabling the garden to be low maintenance and remain beautiful and functional yearround."



Northwest Florida is part of the migratory path of the recently-classified endangered Monarch butterfly, and every fall thousands of Monarchs can be seen enjoying the indigenous flora that grows in Walton County. Since 1992, the CAA has celebrated this natural event with an annual children's arts and science festival called The Flutterby Festival. In its 30th anniversary, the Festival will feature the WMAT guided tours on Saturday, November 12th and a family festival in Watersound® Town Center on Sunday, November 13th.

The guided tours will be co-led by the CAA's Program Manager Courtney Malone and Mello, owner of Sandhills Native Nursery, who will provide guests with fun and educational information about each piece of artwork and how the new native plantings enhance and sustain the overall project while providing habitat for the Monarch butterfly and other important insects. The WMAT guided tours are free and open to the public and are scheduled for Saturday, November 12th at 9:30 a.m. and 11:30 a.m..

The 30th annual Flutterby Festival will take place Sunday, November 13th from 10:00 a.m. - 4:00 p.m. in Watersound® Town Center and will feature food trucks, live music, dance and theatre performances, student butterfly art exhibits, art activities like the butterfly wing creation station and craft-making as well as the butterfly learning center, carnival games, and a butterfly parade at the end of the day.

Professional artists will be exhibiting and selling their work throughout the weekend, and official Flutterby merchandise featuring artwork by local student artist Ella Townley of Seaside School, will be available for purchase. ### Seaside Institute Announces 2023 Seaside Prize Winner: UCLA's Donald Shoup

transportation and city planning. Jeffrey Tumlin, the author of Sustainable Transportation Planning, wrote: "If your city wants to focus on one topic for reducing traffic congestion, improving housing availability, cleaning the air, lessening climate change, making government more efficient, and enlivening the economy—all at the same time—then it should focus on parking."

**6 Practices to Help Clarify Your Dreams** 

#### Focus on the potential, not the problem

The tendency to focus on the problems of life leads to anxious thoughts that anchor you to status quo thinking. When you allow yourself space to imagine the life you want to live, you begin to develop a passion and desire that can move you forward. As I've written before, one of the most powerful and important questions to wrestle with is, "What do I want.... really?"

#### **Postpone edits**

The discipline of dreaming requires postponing edits. Many of us choose to live a limited life because we edit chapters in our life story that haven't been written yet. Focusing on potential and allowing ourselves to dream makes us vulnerable to disruption or disappointment. So, we prematurely edit what could be magnificent stories in favor of a settled life.

#### **Resist either/or thinking**

We have been told ad nauseum, "you can't have your cake and eat it too." While this is true in some situations, there is a temptation to over apply this. As you imagine what is possible give yourself permission and hold yourself accountable to keeping a both/and mindset. Either/ or thinking comes from a scarcity mindset; there is only one cake.

An abundance mindset allows both/and thinking, I can eat my cake and bake more.

#### Figure out what first.... how later

Don't limit your future based on your current capabilities. It's so tempting when you begin to imagine what is possible to quickly begin wondering how to make it happen. When you do this, you shut the door on imagining what is possible and shift to problem solving. You don't have to know how to get there yet. If you already had the skills and knew how to get the outcome you wanted, you would have already done it. When you keep your attention focused on what you desire to be true, you will naturally begin gathering evidence of the behaviors and attitudes that lead you towards that vision or away from it. Getting clear on what you want will contribute, over time, to the clarity of how to get there. When focused on the problem you say, "I don't know how." When focused on the possibility you say, "I don't know how... yet."

#### Leverage what ifs

"What if" thinking can be a blessing or a curse entirely based on how you apply it. When you imagine "what if?" in a negative way you paralyze yourself with fear. What if I can't? What if it fails? While these may be possibilities, so are the positive "what ifs". What if I can? What if it all works out? The challenge here is to intentionally focus on the positive.

#### Be patient, enjoy the journey and make room for serendipity

Dreams shrink when they are rushed. If your vision is big, it will take time. Keep the view in front of you and take the next right step. You don't have to have it all figured out. And, again, if your dream is big enough, you probably won't have it all figured out. We tend to overestimate what we can accomplish in a short amount of time and grossly underestimate what is possible in the long term. Resist the temptation to shrink your dream to fit who you are today. Instead, allow yourself space and time to grow into your dream. Celebrate the steps you take along the way and enjoy those unexplainable moments of serendipity that happen along the way.



Tai Chi (pronounced tie-chee) is a graceful, meditative form of exercise involving a series of movements performed in a slow focused manner, accompanied by deep breathing. It has been around for several thousand years and is practiced by approximately 100 million people in China daily. In America, "more than 2.5 million Americans are practicing Tai Chi to reduce stress and anxiety, increase energy, stamina and flexibility, muscle strength and definition and balance." (Mayoclinic.org)

I discovered Tai Chi at a community center 7 years ago, while searching for a low impact exercise that would help me regain my balance after cancer. What looked like boring, slow motion exercises turned out to be a transformative experience.

After taking that class, not only did my balance improve,

so did my PTSD. My mind was more calm and relaxed after each practice, which allowed my body to activate its own innate healing capabilities. Along with prayer and bible study, Tai Chi is an integral part of my daily routine in taking care of my temple.

"Do you not know that your bodies are temples of the Holy Spirit, who is in you, whom you have received from God? You are not your own; you were bought at a price. Therefore honor God with your bodies." 1 Corithinas 6:19-20

In the meditative part of the practice, I focus my thoughts on gratitude for God's healing power in me, which starts my day with a positive attitude.





"But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion for him; he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him." Luke 15:19-20 (NIV)

As a little boy, I idolized my father. I looked like him, shared his sober demeanor, and I wanted to grow up like him. Then he disappeared. I cried every day, "Where's Daddy?" Finally, my older brother took me aside to say Daddy's gone.

My parent's divorce robbed me of my hero and left me with a lifetime of suppressed grief. Anger simmered beneath the surface and corrupted many of my relationships. Fortunately, God doesn't leave us in our pain

#### and dysfunction.

The parable of the Prodigal Son reveals the nature of God through the response of a loving Father. It also shows the folly of humanity's departure from our Father's house. The great love the Son of God has for us is also on full display.

Imagine this story from the father's point of view. He is a well-to-do landowner with a home commensurate with his wealth and prestige. Dressed in a long robe and fine leather sandals, he carries the dignity of a successful man as he manages his estate. He loves his son, but the son leaves him.

Time passes so slowly as months turn into years. Without cell phones or postal service, the father languishes in the void left by the person he loves more than life.

Coming home from the fields, the elderly man glances toward the horizon and sees a haggard figure approaching. Though a poor and ragged young man, there is something about his walk that is oddly familiar. Peering into the setting sun, his eyes coming into focus, "My son!" he cries.

The elderly father casts his dignity aside, hikes up his robe, and runs as fast as his sandals can clippidy-clop down the dusty pathway. Weeping uncontrollably, he cries out, "My son, my son."

Catching the young man in his arms, the father sweeps aside the boy's contrition. barks out orders to his servants, "Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him. Put my ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Bring the fattened calf and cook it. Let's have a feast and celebrate." The father is the picture of grace as he welcomes his lost son home. His world overflows with joy as love overwhelms past transgressions.

I am that wayward son walking toward Father God. In my life, I have wasted myself on lessor gods and made poor choices. Coming to myself in the pigpen of my own making, the Holy Spirit silently whispered to me, "Come back to the Father." Each time, the Lord welcomed me because Jesus paved that road with His sacrifice.

A Pastor's Ponderings: Clippidy-Clop



We are an impatient people. We want everything now. Fast food, lightning-fast internet speed, faster computer processors. Waiting isn't on our list of things we want to do anymore. We want what we want when we want it.

But God, as we know full well, has no problem with waiting for the right time as He orchestrates and trains His child to be ready to receive what was promised. Abraham and Sarah waited 25 years for Isaac, after God gave them the promise. David waited 15 years before taking the throne, after he was anointed by Samuel.

Our lives contain only so many years, so we grasp for what we want. But God is never in a hurry. His timing is perfect, and since He lives outside of time itself, He isn't constrained by it. Andrea Ward wanted something with all her heart, and she knew it was a desire that God had placed there. It seemed like the fulfillment of that desire would never arrive. But in due time, God brought her dream to fruition.

In her mid-twenties, Andrea was engaged to be married. Her plan fell apart when her fiancé abandoned her two months before the wedding. Shaken to her core, she said "what am I going to do? I'm nothing without him." That's when God showed her that He was all she needed. Andrea became actively involved in church again, and one Sunday her pastor spoke about the desire of your heart, and Andrea had to admit that she didn't know what that was. She spent some quiet time hiking in Arizona, communing with her Heavenly Father, and He showed her what her heart's desire was. It was to be a mother.

She began to pray every day for a child, a baby girl, and

the years slowly ticked by. Five years, then ten years, then more time went by. She contacted an adoption agency and was told she would need to be prepared



for a long wait. She put in an application, and nine months and one day later, her daughter was born. Her daughter's biological mother actually chose Andrea to adopt her baby.

Andrea was 44 years old when her heart's desire was fulfilled. She figured out that what she thought was a delay, was God making her ready. Andrea cherishes every single moment together with her daughter. "I don't take anything lightly."

"I know she is truly a gift from God." Andrea had prayed for a baby girl for 17 years. "Waiting on God isn't easy, but I believed for God to fulfill the desire of my heart." She recalls that verse in I Samuel, "For this child I have prayed", spoken by Hannah, Samuel's mother, another woman who prayed for a child. As Andrea says, the scripture doesn't tell us how many years Hannah waited or how many tears she cried, but we know she trusted God in the journey.

"Our human nature doesn't allow us to be perfect and understand God's will. Digging into God's word and praying, and seeking out community that will lift you up, is important."

Every day Andrea and her daughter give thanks to God. She is teaching her daughter about praying to grow in her faith as she encounters bumps and pits in the road. 

### Who Do You Want on Your Team?

My son, Kyle, is a fan of Steve Harvey on the Family Feud. He posed the question to me recently of, "if I were to be selected to appear on the show, who would be the four other family members that I would select to join me?" From my competitive and at times harsh perspective, my response was it would be those that led to the best chances of winning. I also opined to Kyle that if it were my wife and his mother's call she would focus more on not hurting anyone's feelings. She's a lot nicer than me.

We ran an exercise during basketball practices, the threeman weave. The objective was to pass the ball to a teammate and "cut" behind them, creating a "weave" up and down the court. If any of the three passed errantly, or dropped the ball, all would end up running laps as punishment. During the drill our coach would bellow, "watch who you get with," adding "no matter how good you are, if you surround yourself with 'mullets' you will perform down to that level." Years later, I've found no truer words to be spoken personally or professionally.

How do you go about deciding who to "get with?"

During the search process, the focus is on the job candidate. Does the cover letter and resume create attraction? Are there others that can attest to individual? Does the applicant's work record reflect stability, integrity, and progression?

With those boxes checked, it often continues to where the person is invited for an actual job interview. Having interviewed literally thousands of people over the years, I became aware of not only the patterns and rhythm of applicants, but also some of my own biases. I've heard it said that an interviewer's tendency is to reach an opinion on an individual within the first three to five minutes of the encounter. Cognizant of that inclination I would often find fascination with those who did not make the most favorable first impression, but rather 20 or 30 minutes into the interview would offer something profound or differentiate themselves from others. I ended up being drawn to those persons from the standpoint of attempting to build a team comprised of those that would offer diverse viewpoints and perspectives. As a result, I believe stronger work units were developed.

Leave no doubt, in my experience those who were most articulate and thoughtful during the interview were most often successful in their job pursuits.

Thoughtful... So often the emphasis during the interview process is predicated upon the questions the interviewer asks and the answers the applicants provide. Yet equally important,

the character and ethic of the I believe, are the questions the applicant asks of the interviewer. They indicate not only preparation for the interview but genuine interest in the job itself and the people associated with it. In addition, they can be key to determining for the candidate whether the environment is a place where community and connection may be found.

> What are some good questions?

Tell me about yourself (to the interviewer).

What do you enjoy most about working here?

What does the organization value?

What are the traits of those who are most successful in this environment?

In what ways does this company contribute back to the community?

What are the greatest challenges this organization faces in the short- to mid-term future? How is the company positioning itself to be up to those obstacles?

If there were one thing that you were to see as an opportunity for improvement in the organization, what might that be?

By all means, have questions. I always found the least impressive interviews were ones where at the end I would ask, "what questions might you have?," and the applicant would answer, "none."

In my Career Coaching practice, it is notable the number of clients regretful of some of

their work choices. More often than not, I find it was either a case of a "desperate" decision coupled with failure to adequately vet the company.

Watch who you get with.

### **Embarrassed**

When I was about five years old, my family checked into a hotel room while on a vacation. The sliding glass door to our room was adjacent to the swimming pool. My two older brothers and I decided to race to see who could be the first to change into a bathing suit and jump into the pool. I quickly jumped out of my clothes and was the first into the water. There was just one problem. In my haste to be first, I forgot to put on my swimming suit. Of course my mom just so happened to be filming the whole event. That is

one video clip I pray never makes it to social media.

Years ago, I was speaking at a venue which sat 5,500 people. This event was being televised on a world-wide network. My wife Catrina was sitting in the front row. As I began my presentation, she started making hand gestures. I wasn't sure what her motions meant, but I immediately looked at my pants to make sure my zipper wasn't open. Thank the Lord it was pulled up. Whatever she was motioning about couldn't be too bad. Or could it?

Catrina started making the type of motions a third base coach would make when he wanted you to steal from first to second. While trying to stay focused on my presentation, I peaked down to make sure my shoe laces were tied. That wasn't it. I tried my best to read my wife's lips, but could not figure out what she was saying. It was as if we were playing a game of charades in the middle of my speech. By this time, others in the audience started looking at her and were picking up on our unsuccessful attempts to communicate.

Not wanting to distract any



further, I quit looking at Catrina and just focused on the audience. When the event was over, she met me in the green room and said, "you still don't see it do you?" She then pointed to the sleeve of my new sports jacket. There it was, a two-inch white price tag, still attached to the sleeve, just like it was when I picked it off the rack in the store. I was so nervous to speak in front of such a large audience, I did something silly I had never done before.

We all find ourselves in awkward or humiliating situations at some point in our lives. It may come from slipping on the ice while trying to skate. It may come from knocking over a shelf of items in the supermarket. It may come from opening a fire door and setting off the alarm. It may come from a fellow employee noticing your socks don't match. Some people can shake off embarrassment quickly, but if we fear disapproval of others, we can become consumed thinking about our embarrassments. Embarrassment is a highly individualized experience, but it is intensified when others are watching us. When others

witness what we have done, there is no denying it. We can try to mask our embarrassment with a smile or nervous laughter, but on the inside we feel like crying.

Embarrassment is considered a self-conscious emotion. It can have a negative effect on our thoughts and behaviors for years, or even for a lifetime. Unwanted nicknames given to us in elementary school from embarrassing moments can haunt us forever. Replaying embarrassing events over and over in our minds may even cause us to believe others no longer accept us. The remedy is simple: Forget the mistake...remember the lesson. Embarrassment can actually serve a good purpose. It can motivate us to never make the same mistake again. Admitting weakness is hard, but if we stop taking ourselves so seriously and become a bit more humble, laughing at ourselves can be one of the most therapeutic things we can ever do.

# Recipe of the Month: **Italian Wedding Soup with Turkey Meatballs**

This Italian Wedding Soup is packed with immune boosting and good for you foods, like lemon, dill, spinach, bone broth, and much needed lean protein.

Wedding soup is not so named because it is served at Italian weddings, but because the flavors of stock and bitter greens 'marry' well to produce a harmony of flavors: a Minestra Maritata.

#### Ingredients

- 4 cups chicken broth
- 4 cups bone broth 3 tablespoons good olive oil
- 2 tablespoons butter 1 pound lean ground turkey



1/2 cup gluten free panko bread crumbs 1/3 packed cup fresh parsley

leaves, finely chopped

1 egg, lightly beaten 3 to 4 garlic cloves, minced 1 small onion, chopped 1/2 small onion, minced 1 teaspoon kosher salt

1/2 teaspoon black pepper <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> cup freshly grated Parme-

san cheese, plus more for serving <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup gluten free orzo, ditalini, acini di pepe or other small soup pasta

3 packed cups baby spinach, chiffonade aka thinly sliced

1 lemon, zested and juiced <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> cup fresh dill, roughly chopped

#### Preparation

In a large heavy bottom pot, melt 1 tablespoon of butter and add 2 tablespoons of olive oil.

Saute 1/2 chopped small onion until it sweats and is translucent. Add 2 quarts (8 cups) chicken and bone broth to the pot and bring to a simmering boil.

In a large bowl, add the turkey, panko, parsley, egg, garlic, salt, pepper and 1/2 cup Parmesan to a large bowl as well as 1/2small onion, minced finely. Mix with a fork or your clean hands until combined. Gently roll the mixture into 15-20 small (1 1/2inch) meatballs and transfer to a lightly greased baking sheet.

Heat the broiler to high, cooking the meatballs until brown, turning halfway through, about 5 minutes per side. Watch carefully so they don't burn.

Add the pasta to the boiling broth and cook until al dente, then lower the heat to a low simmer.

Add the meatballs to the broth and simmer on low until completely warmed through, 3 to 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Remove from the heat, and add the spinach, dill, lemon and zest, stirring well. Season with salt and pepper to taste.

When serving the soup, drizzle each with olive oil, and sprinkle with Parmesan. And, serve with crusty toasted sourdough bread.

Pro tip: The meatballs can be made ahead of time and used for sandwiches, soups, and pasta dishes.

DF: Beethoven is immortal. When you pair or mash Beethoven up with something on the pop scene, like Coldplay it's unexpected. For this concert, they're not just playing a piece by Beethoven and a piece by Coldplay side by side. This is a melding, a mashup of the internal, interwoven musical notation with vocalists and it is remarkable. It's an incredible way to listen to and rethink how music is connected. Steve Hackman, the producer, is a brilliant musician, composer, and arranger. It's totally unique, but it's accessible. How many people from the age of 15 don't know Coldplay? So, again, we hope this innovative offering brings in some new faces.

**ZW:** At the heart of Sinfonia's mission is music education. Tell us why.

**DF:** Our mission states succinctly that we "entertain, educate, inspire the community" and we aim to do that with everything we do. Education is the centerpiece of Sinfonia. It was founded not only for its entertainment value, but for the fact that Northwest Florida needed an organization that could be the proponent for arts education in schools, specifically music education. We all know arts education is on a continual decline in all public schools. We've been more fortunate here in Northwest Florida, compared to some areas but in many cases our Link Up program, which is a year-long curriculum, is sometimes the only arts education these students receive.

We have a String Quartet, a resident Brass Quintet, and a Woodwind Quintet in residence — all going out to schools and the community and providing outreach and community engagement.

This year, we are reintroducing the Paint the Music project, which is a great cross-genre program that includes both visual arts and the musical arts. Kids receive a recording of what they will ultimately hear live at a Sinfonia concert, and they visually interpret what they hear on to paper. We take their artwork and display it at a concert. (Look for the Paint the Music exhibit at Get Happy in January.) When I conduct insulation inspections in attics, I normally come out with sweat on my forehead and, sometimes, depending on the inspection and time of year, I am completely drenched. Sweating is normal to keep our bodies cool. But when our home sweats, that's an indication of a problem. Receiving calls from concerned homeowners about sweating vents and equipment is common at ECES.

There can be many factors which cause condensation in the home; ultimately it is the dew point in our attics. Dew point defines the point at which air will become saturated and condense. Simply, the air can't hold any more moisture and creates dew.

So, why do I have moisture on my vents? Ductwork is a system or network of ducts which bring cool air to the different rooms and living areas of our homes. When heating and cooling companies install the air ducts in a home, the contractors are working with many separate pieces. While the workers strive to connect each piece as tightly and securely as possible, leaks

mastic (which are a type of paste applied to seams when foil tape can't seal) is used to reseal these leaks keeping the conditioned air flowing for years to come. We tend to forget how important these systems really are and how important it is to maintain them. It is always a great idea to schedule an inspection and improve the efficiency of our largest investment, our homes.

Foil tape, expandable foam and



and gaps in the ducts might still occur. This can happen in new and older homes. When these gaps and leaks occur, the conditioned air leaks out into our attics. A typical home can experience close to 20% of conditioned air loss from leaking ducts If the leaks are big enough, even more loss can occur costing you money and comfort.

One common problem when ducts and vents are not sealed properly is condensation or sweating. These tiny drops build up around and on the vents causing issues, like mold.

Another problem we come across is cracked seals and loose boots. Maybe you had a security system installed or needed cable ran into a room which wasn't wired. Most of the time you need a technician to go in the attic and navigate in a hot, hard- to-walk-around, dark area while performing these services. Ductwork tends to run in the same places these wires need to be run and sometimes ductwork is used as railing or support by the technician so they don't end up putting their foot through your ceiling. Putting pressure on ductwork can cause loose boots around vents and cracked seams. These are less common, but do happen and, unfortunately, are unseen, because they happen in the attic. More common is that over time, our seams, connectors, tape and vent boxes fail over time due to the harsh environment they are in. Failing tape is most common. The duct tape, which was used, becomes brittle and can no longer keep a tight seal.

Good news is that repairing these leaks is a simple one.

It can also include the extra expense of operating out of a temporary location.

Liability coverage, which protects your company's legal responsibility for the harm done to others. 
