A Path to Transformation

Path of Grace (POG) provides a way out for women caught in the destructive lifestyle of addiction through discovering their identity and purpose in Christ. Eddie Mansfield has been its director for 12 years. He compassionately understands these residents' journey as he too had wandered off the right path, but later found his way back to God's path of grace through Christ from a life of addiction many years ago.

POG has a structured faith-based culture effectively producing transformation, with an 85-90 percent success rate (two-year program)! Aspects of the program include Bible study, prayer, work at their thrift store (in $Santa\,Rosa\,Beach\,and\,Panama$ City), attending AA, church, parenting classes, individual and group therapy. They also learn various skill sets such as sales, management, truck driving, customer service and construction.

At graduation, each 2-year girl receives a "nest egg" of \$8,100 for her fresh start.

Confirmed EF 2 Tornado in South Walton Hits Driftwood Estates Neighborhood

National Weather Service (NWS) Tallahassee conducted preliminary damage assessments in the affected areas of South Walton, where they confirmed January 22th's severe weather system as an EF 2 tornado with maximum wind speeds of approximately 115 MPH.

According to NWS, the tornado touched down in the Driftwood Estates subdivision between Riverbirth Loop and Cocobolo Drive at approximately 5:14am. Traveling northeast, the system lifted briefly over a boarding wooded area, then touched down on Red Bay Court and continued northeast until lifting into the Choctawhatchee Bay at 5:15am. The path was approximately 0.8 miles in length, with a maximum width of 85 yards.

On Sunday, January 22nd, South Walton Fire District (SWFD) and Walton County Sheriff's Office (WCSO) responded to reports of potential lightning strikes to homes. After further investigation, responding agencies found varying levels

To ensure the continued recovery of the graduates and reunite mothers with their children, POG has completed Phase I of Serenity Village, eight transitional cottages. Because of the financial and emotional challenges to start over, this offers a safe environment and a continued support system to thrive together as a family.

of water and wind damage to homes and conducted welfare checks throughout the area. Walton County Emergency Management (WCEM) conducted initial damage assessments to the affected area and surveyed the potential unmet needs of the community. The Red Cross assisted with case management and provided alternative housing for displaced residents.

'Given the speed with which the tornado developed, we're grateful to report no injuries from this event," said WCEM Director, Jeff Goldberg. "Our team witnessed the selflessness of

neighbors supporting neighbors and a seamless response from our partnering agencies. We're grateful for the swift response and look forward to assisting this community in returning to normalcy."

Damage assessments were



conducted on Cocobolo Drive, Pin Oak Loop, Loblolly Bay Drive, Red Bay Court, and Driftwood Point Road in Santa Rosa Beach, Florida. Combined data from WCEM, NWS Tallahassee, and the Residential Self-Reporting tool estimated a total of 37 impacted homes, with classifications ranging from affected to major. Numerous properties received damage, including broken fences, heavy vegetation, and widespread debris.

Residents impacted by the Driftwood Estates Tornado are encouraged to complete the Walton County Emergency Management Damage Reporting Survey to help determine the scope of the storm's impacts and address any unmet needs. The Walton County School District continues to make historical achievements in education! The Florida Department of Education recently published graduation data for the 2021-2022 school year showing our Walton County School District with a graduation rate increase of 5% in a single year which is phenomenal! This increase gives Walton County the third highest number of students receiving their diplomas; in fact, this is 10% above the state average! In an inclusive look, this is an unprecedented 20% percent increase in the last six years! We are proud of the students who worked hard and the teachers and staff who collaborated with them to help them succeed.

Walton School District celebrated excellent teachers and teacher support personnel at the annual Educational Support Personnel (ESP)and Teacher of the Year (TOY) Recognition Event this month. Each school's staff selected and submitted the name of teacher and support personnel that they believed embodied the spirit of E.P.I.C. Those chosen represented their campus in the District selection for ESP and TOY. On Thursday, January 19,2023, Ms. Shelly Hinojosa was chosen as Teacher of the Year and Roslyn Chatman was chosen as Education Support Personnel of the Year Both will represent Walton County School District in State Competition later in the year. 

Tips from the Trainer: Coffee and Dogs

I was asked a question recently that I would like to share with my readers. "I'd like to know why my dog loves every dog and person inside my house, plays well outside too... but when he sees them outside the house through the window he rips the blinds down."

This is more common than people might think. There are many reasons a dog might do this so I will attempt to break it down into the most likely reason without having met your dog.

The barrier between your dog and people can pose a serious problem. It can be frustrating when your dog makes visual con-

tact with a person on the outside of your home. Energy can build like the cartoon character who swirls fire in their hands. That energy can be misused because your dog may simply want to play! It is hard for some dogs to decompress. When this energy is not released the dog becomes frustrated and redirects the energy. For some dogs this is shown through excessive barking, while in others it turns destructive. We must stop the energy from building.

What is the solution? Training, teaching, and showing your dog how to remain calm. Doing so requires dog owners to be intentional in their efforts by staging scenarios within which to train.



I use a method called "coffee and dogs." The concept is pretty simple. First, get a great cup of coffee poured and have your dog on a leash. Have a seat, put your foot on the leash while your dog lays next to you. The idea is for you to enjoy that cup of coffee while your dog remains by your side. By having your foot on the leash, the dog cannot get up people can walk by, trucks can drive by, dogs can pass by and your dog remains calmly by your side. As your dog attempts to get

up, a little pressure on the leash will ensure he stays put. After a few attempts, and the dog has not been able to engage at the window, the dog begins to calm down and relax. This is effective with almost any dog because it has a positive outcome. Your dog will see that there was no harm in simply ignoring the passersby. Having your friends assist by passing by should be simple enough, or if you know the routine of people passing by your house, set the time aside and be

prepared to train!

Drive switching is an important part of owning a dog and dealing with behavioral issues. Knowing what drive the dog is engaging, and effectively redirecting the drive is critical to having a balanced relationship.

Get a cup of coffee and practice a little "coffee and dogs" in public places, too. Enjoy your dog more by having a dog that doesn't need to engage every person or every dog no matter the circumstance! Teach your dog to rest.

I will be doing "Coffee and Dogs" training once the weather is more consistent and pleasant temperatures prevail. We will simply sit and have coffee with our dogs. I'll give you an hour of adult interaction and instruct how to hold the leash while maintaining a sense of calm. All I ask in return is that someone buy my cup of coffee! Our area affords us so much opportunity to enjoy our dogs outdoors that we should embrace it. This increase means Walton County has the third-highest number of students walking across the stage to receive their diplomas – 10% above the state average.

The new year has begun for investors. After watching both the stock and market experience significant drawdowns in 2022 (a rarity for the two to move in tandem), people wondered what the new year might bring. Thus far, we have been showered by the media with talk of recession. stoking fear into the hearts and minds of consumers. Eventually, consumers begin to over worry and they begin to snap their wallets shut. This, however, does not seem to be the case, at least not yet. At this writing, while the economy has most definitely slowed, many companies continue to make money. Seventy-one percent of companies reporting their Q4 earnings have surpassed expectations

Investment Strategies for 2023

We are left to wonder which is the greatest evil: a recession, inflation or deflation. Inflation over time erodes the standard of living and is not sustainable. Deflation, we think, is the worst of outcomes as it is a collapse of demand and it eventually pulls the economy down, perhaps into a depression. We are reminded of a quote Ronald Reagan repeated more than once: A recession is when your neighbor loses his job, and a depression is when you lose yours. A recession is an economic reset and investors are reminded to take note that when the economy is seemingly at its worst, that is the time to invest in stocks if they are long-term, growth-oriented investors and have the tolerance for the risk

What is driving us here?

The Federal Reserve, whether we like it or not, has significant influence in the economy. The Fed has taken its Federal Funds Rate to 4.5 percent and by the time you read this may very well be at 4.75 or 5 percent. What does that rate do? First of all it is the rate it pays to banks and to money market mutual funds for deposits and investments made overnight.

The Fed has an average of

\$3 trillion on deposit each night from banks. It also has about \$2.6 trillion from several money market mutual funds. If banks put that money at the Fed, they are not lending it. If investors and savers are putting money in money market mutual funds, they are not investing it in stocks, bonds, businesses or a host of other things. Since 2008, the Fed has used the federal funds rate to slow an overheated economy, usually one that manifests itself by the inflation read. If less money is available to the economy, that in theory should slow demand, bringing inflation down. It seems to be working. Some worry, however, that it may end up working too much and that the economy will crash land versus soft land. We will have to see.

The impact of this can be seen in the leveling off of interest rates.

Short-term rates are remarkably higher than-long term rates. Investors take note that in times like these, that is by design. That can work to the advantage of savers and those wanting to have lower-risk investments with higher returns than in the past. If the inverted yield curve (where shorter rates are higher than longer term rates) persists, a slower economy will bring down inflation and also long-term rates, including mortgage rates. The implication is that investors should consider investing in longer term bonds be those U.S. Treasuries, municipals or corporate bonds. For retirement accounts, investors also might consider taxable municipal bonds for their quality relative to corporates and their competitive rates. Many investors can diversify their long-term portfolios by incorporating these types of bonds for a portion of their strategy. Investors might also want to consider zero coupon bonds, mainly in retirement accounts as a way of not only diversifying, but knowing what they will have and when they will have it. Zero coupon bonds are bought at a discount from their face value. Bonds have a face value of \$1,000 and a zero coupon bond may sell for \$750 now for example and be worth \$1,000 at maturity. The difference is the rate that the investor earns. Lastly, other fixed rate investments like CDs and fixed annuities offer lower risk and portfolio diversity.

Other considerations for times like these

We continue to think that part of a diversified portfolio should include increased weightings into health care, energy, consumer staples, utilities and financial sector stocks. Increased allocations into fixed income, or bonds could be part of a well-diversified portfolio. Lastly, we think investors should continue to watch the value of the dollar, as its continued slide would mean accelerated growth in international investments (which of course brings on more risk).

Last tidbits

We read that for the first time in decades, China's population has declined (by more than 850,000 people). We also read that in 2022, for the first time in a long time, many index funds underperformed the market. That might be so because index funds are weighted by market capitalization. With approximately 27 percent of the S&P 500 into the technology sector, and that sector had significant drawdown in 2022, that might explain it. Should China continue to decline in population, that has worldwide implications for demands as well as for pricing and inflation. Lastly, if interest rates slow or reverse, investors tend to take more risk in

Now that we are well into the new year, investors are encouraged to perform portfolio reviews with their advisers or on their own. Working with an advisor might deliver "alpha," that is, increased value for cost paid. Gary J. Gregor, Walton County Property Appraiser, reminds property owners who intend to make application for Homestead Exemption, Deployed Military Exemption, Combat Disabled Veteran's Discount, Veteran's Exemption, Disability Exemption, Agricultural Classification, Additional Senior Exemption, or Widow's and Widower's Exemption, the absolute filing deadline is **MARCH 1, 2023.**

If you plan to file your exemption for the first time, please bring with you a copy of your recorded deed or tax receipt, the social security number(s) of all owners of property, Florida driver's license number, Florida auto tag number, and voter's registration number. If you are entitled to disability exemption, please bring proof of disability (two doctors' statements). If you are filing Homestead Exemption on a mobile home, please bring the title or registration certificate. If you are filing for the "Additional Exemption for Persons 65 and Older" your annual household income cannot exceed \$35,167 (adjusted annually) (proof will be required).

If you would like information to determine your eligibility for exemptions, please call **850-892-8123** or **850-267-4500**, Monday thru Friday, 8:00 a.m. until 4:30 p.m.



Self-Care: The Path to Loving Others Well

Self-care has become a cultural buzzword over the last decade. Doctors, therapists and social media influencers instruct us to take time for a spa day, a

round of golf, a bubble bath, reading a book or a weekend getaway. While all of these are relaxing, the intense demands of life seem to deserve higher priority. Perhaps you find yourself wondering how you're supposed to make time for something so "frivolous and selfish" in the face of serious concerns like the physical/mental health of family members, work demands and the everyday balance of keeping life and family going. Maybe you find yourself asking "What is self-care and what's the point?"

At a surface level, self-care is: a break, a moment for yourself, space to calm, leisure, enjoyable, fun. Self-care, however, goes much deeper than this. When we keep overbusy schedules, attempt to please everyone, expect perfection from ourselves, avoid saying no, and care for others in high gear daily, our human bodies and brains eventually hit a wall. We become resentful, exhausted, short-tempered, depressed, anxious and emotionally/spiritually run down. Often, the consequences of not taking care of ourselves result in unintentional destruction to the very relationships we are working hard to manage well.

We accidentally embrace a belief and lifestyle that says we are less important, lovable, and valuable than those we love. We jump from healthy sacrificial love to a place of ignoring our own needs and failing to take care of ourselves. At its heart, self-care is the practice of remembering through action that you are as loved, lovable and valuable as everyone else in your life.

Self-care is about admitting to yourself that you are a more loving, more present parent, partner and friend when you prioritize your physical, emotional and spiritual needs. When you embrace the deeper meaning of self-care, it moves from frivolous selfishness to the path of loving others well.

5 Ways to Begin a Self-Care Practice

Identify 3-5 activities that feel like a life exhale. Start small. One minute of deep breathing, a 15-minute walk, a five-minute devotional/meditation, a 10-minute cup of coffee are short examples of slowing down to acknowledge your value. You can work toward longer activities like a dance class, a full game of your favorite hobby, a long bath, lunch with a friend.

Do one thing at a time. Set aside time for your self-care activity and do your best not to multitask. Our brains feel more relaxed and satisfied when we do one thing at a time. Be kind to yourself and give yourself this period of time to communicate to yourself that you are loved and worth the time.

Avoid numbing. Taking care of yourself is different than numbing out. Numbing is avoiding and becomes a cycle of not wanting to re-engage. Self-care is an intentional calming time you are taking to fill your cup so you show up in your life as a more full, energized version of yourself. Typical numbing activities include drinking alcohol, spending and scrolling electronics. Try noticing when you're confusing numbing with self-care.

Set boundaries with oth-

ers. When possible, tell others in your life that you're taking time for yourself and ask them not to interrupt you unless there's an emergency. You may feel guilty at first and that's okay. Stick with self-care and remember you are a better version of you for others when you take care of yourself. People in your life can and will learn to respect your self-care time through time and repeti-

Relax into the moment and enjoy. It may take some practice to let go and enjoy your self-care moments. Take a few deep breaths, release tension where you notice it. Release expectations of yourself for a few minutes. Small pockets of reprieve from life stress are a gift to your body, your soul, and to your loved ones.



Health Insurance Trends in 2023

Last year's omnibus spending bill included \$14.1 billion for SSA (Social Security Administration) to help solve their customer service crisis. If you have tried to call your social security office, you know what I mean. It is reported that one out of five calls are never answered, and waiting periods have more than doubled.

Staffing shortages are at a 25year low and this is compounded by the fact that the number of new beneficiaries has increased by 22%, go Boomers! Those making online applications for Medicare Part B have experienced increased delays in getting their applications approved. Processing time has increased from a few weeks to up to 90 days. I would recommend that if you are not collecting social security, you apply as early as possible at ww.ssa.gov/Medicare. You can do so 4-3 months before your birth month or desired effective date.

Other Medicare news for 2023 includes additional benefits on most Advantage plans. Dental/vision and hearing benefits have increased on most plans. On the negative side, PDP or prescription drug plans have in-

creased in price.

There is also a trend for more folks to sign up for a Medicare Supplement Plan N over a Plan G. The premium for a Plan G can be \$25-\$40 more per month compared to a Plan N. The biggest difference is that you as pay a \$20 copay for doctor visits and \$50 for an emergency room visit. You are also subject to a 15% excess charge for doctors and hospitals that don't accept the Medicare reimbursement rates. There are other considerations which I would be happy to explain but in general, Plan N rates should be more stable and not increase as much as Plan G rates.

What has happened on the under 65-year-old side regarding individual insurance?

Individual deductibles and out of pocket maximums have increased and drug coverage has been reduced. It is fortunate that other pharmacy options are available without using your insurance. I would suggest having a conversation with your pharmacist to see if they can recommend a more affordable way to buy your prescriptions.

Open enrollment is now closed for both Medicare and Individual plans for 2023.

There are Special Enrollment Periods such as a major life change or move outside of your service area. But for the most part, what you have now will be in effect until the end of the year. Walrath opened the event and led the program. Roger Hall, who served as hospital



president from 2002 until 2020, provided a reflection and prayer. Participants honored 20-year associates, providers and volunteers. They also enjoyed food including tacos and barbecue catered by Grayton Beach Catering and live music provided by The Backsliders.

In 2000, community members began a purple ribbon

campaign, raising \$20 million toward hospital construction, with the land being donated by the St. Joe Company. The next year, construction began on the \$53 million facility. Ascension Sacred Heart Emerald Coast opened on January 27, 2003.

Since then, the hospital has added a joint replacement program, the Family Birth Place,



a heart and vascular center, robotic spine surgery services and expanded primary and specialty care services throughout the area. Most recently, the hospital opened a Level II NICU, two new women's diagnostic centers and expanded pediatric and emergency services backed by Studer Family Children's Hospital.

This year, thanks to generous donors, the hospital will be adding a new CT machine to improve access to quality imaging services as well as patient convenience and safety.

The 20-year milestone

will continue to be celebrated throughout the year including at the upcoming Emerald Ball on Saturday, February 4.

A Pastor's Ponderings: The Parable of the Lowest

For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted. (Luke 14:7-12, NIV)

I'm reminded of the journey of Raindrop.

Once upon a time there was a wee little Raindrop in a faraway cloud that grew as moisture gathered around her. Soon, she grew so heavy she began falling, falling, falling from the sky.

"Ka-plop." She landed on earth.

Slowly, Raindrop joined Tiny Trickle as they crept down the mountainside to join Small Stream. Raindrop and Trickle flowed down, down, down with Stream until they gushed into Raging River.

Flowing downward in that great river, Raindrop continued her descent, jumbling, tumbling, and bumping against rocks and boulders. "Ouch, that hurts!" she cried.

Raindrop continued cascading lower, lower and lower to the vastness of Great Salton Sea. She felt lost, alone, and afraid in the ocean's vastness. Raindrop pondered the meaning of her downward trip.

Scorching Sun beat mercilessly upon poor little Raindrop, and she felt so tired from her journey. She was empty, empty, empty of energy. Finally, she gave herself up, evaporating into Boundless Sky.

Raindrop pleaded with Abundant Cloud of the heavens, "Why did I have such a humbling journey, always tumbling downward?"

Abundant Cloud consoled her, "You are one of my teardrops of love, descending to the earth to quench the thirst of people. You were my gift sent to them. My servants must be meek and lowly of heart. They always seek the lowest place at the banquet table for I gave them to serve all humanity before they return to Me."

Jesus showed the law of the lowest when He, King of heaven, descended to earth and took on the form of a servant. He gave Himself as an offering to atone for our sins. Emptying Himself of His divine glory and pouring His life out to God as a sacrifice reveal this divine principle.

Our passage in Luke presents Christ sitting down to dinner with a "ruler of the Pharisees." Jesus wants to teach his host the nature of love. So, He first heals a man of dropsy. Then, the Lord salts his teaching with a parable set in a wedding reception.

The story seems to ask us, "Where do you sit when you go to a wedding reception or a church dinner? With whom do you sit? What do you talk about?" The answers to these questions tell your story. If you are ambitious or have a positive self-image, you

will probably gravitate to the front. If you have good friends present, you will settle in with them. Or perhaps you want to hide in the back anonymously, because you are shy, regretful or ashamed.

Jesus pushes us in a new direction. He tells us to seat others before we seat ourselves, serve the lonely and the disenfranchised. He urges us to the back of the bus with the down and outers. If you look closely, you will sometimes find Jesus in the face of those you serve.

The downward track of humility is the pathway to God's heart. Paul said of Jesus in Philippians 2:6-7, "Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death — even death on a cross!"

Both my simple fable and Christ's parable illustrates a pow-

erful kingdom principle. Humble submission moves us to seek the lowest place in order to lift others. Jesus, even though He was equal to God, humbled Himself and became human, suffering death as a criminal on a cross. Because of His obedience to God's will, the Father lifted Jesus and gave Him a name above every name. He lowered Himself to the lowest place and God lifted Him to the highest place.

I believe God orchestrates challenges for us that will present opportunities to choose the path of humility. I hear Jesus saying metaphorically, "Move to the back of the banquet hall and let others go first and you will be lifted up in due time."

The Road to Redemption: Harrison Ashler – The Miracle of God's Grace

Some years ago, a small book was written entitled Hinds Feet on High Places by Hannah Hurnard. It's an allegory, and a beautiful one. The main character's name was Much Afraid, and she truly desired to know the Chief Shepherd better. When He called her to go on a journey with Him, she agreed, even though she trembled in fear. Because the Chief Shepherd couldn't be with her the entire journey, He gave her two companions, named Sorrow and Suffering, whose task was to assist Much Afraid and help her over the hard places. She learned and grew stronger, with Sorrow and Suffering her constant helpers. One day, as she stumbled over the bare rocks, she saw a yellow flower growing out of them, with its solitary face lifted to the sun. Much Afraid asked the delicate flower its name. "I am Acceptance with Joy," it replied.

Harrison Ashler was born and raised in Pensacola, regularly attending church and singing in the choir. Like many young men, he met and married a wonderful woman, had a baby and bought a house. Life was good.

In September of 2015, God reached down and touched Harrison. He experienced a brain hemorrhage/stroke that turned his and his family's lives upside down. He had a seizure, was intubated in the hospital and taken to Sacred Heart in Pensacola where the doctors discovered a brain bleed.



He woke up with a tube down his throat and a broken arm. "I pulled the tube out of my throat and alarms went off." The attending nurse called Harrison's wife and told her that her husband was awake and wanted to see her. Harrison is considered a walking miracle to have had a brain bleed and stroke with no side effects at all. "I was in the furnace and came out without the smell of smoke."

Life went on, and then God touched him again. A few years later, Harrison was singing in choir and had a major seizure, where he discovered that his drinking had to stop.

"God has delivered me and broken the chains of alcohol through all of these trials, and I would go through it a hundred times over to be free from that bondage." Harrison was around drinking a lot in college — he thought that's what adults did, but for him it had gotten out of hand. His neurologist told him it was like throwing kerosene on a wildfire. Even then, Harrison still hadn't learned the lesson. He figured he could have just one drink. Three ambulance rides later, God finally got him to stop drinking completely and he is now soher.

"My epilepsy, stroke and brain bleed has given me way more than it has taken away. You can't be what you don't see. My boys will see me not drinking. God has broken the generational curses."

We often wonder why bad things happen and why God allows suffering. He brings difficulty and tragedy into our lives to open our eyes to see Him and know Him. God may heal us to bring Himself glory or not heal us to also bring Himself glory. In either instance He uses our pain and suffering to teach us more about His love and mercy. When we are brought low and Jesus shows up to heal and comfort us, that intensely personal experience of knowing we are deeply loved and cherished is transformational.

"You can either live a full life or merely exist. I am living a fuller life because of the tragedy that happened to me."

The first concert I ever saw was the Oak Ridge Boys. I was 2 years old. Mama took me. I pooped my diaper while they were singing "Elvira." My mother changed me at the foot of the stage as I was singing at the top of my voice. One of the Oak Ridge Boys gagged, midsong.

"That's Mama's little musician," said my mother, wiping my hindparts.

The next concert I ever saw was the "Grand Ole Opry." My father moved us to Tennessee because he was building the GM plant in Spring Hill. Mama knew I loved music, so she carried me to "country music's biggest stage."

I remember seeing Jerry Clower. I remember a bluegrass group practically lighting their instruments on fire. I remember Minnie Pearl.

During the Opry performance, Mama stood me on the back of the pew so I could sing along. She kissed my cheeks and said, "That's Mama's little musician."

Mama bought my first nice guitar. It was the first "fine" instrument I ever owned. A Gibson. Student model, B-15. It was indestructible. You could use this guitar to tenderize meat. I still have it.

And it was Mama who bought my first piano on my 9th birthday. Mama bought a second-hand piano from the classifieds. She sent my father to pick it up. He bribed his friends to move the instrument with cases of free Busch. As a result, the piano was beat to heck.

I began playing piano in church at age 10. I was an accompanist. My mother was so proud. She always sat on the front pew at church and told innocent bystanding visitors that I was her son. "He's our little musician."


Throughout the years, I would go on to break my mother's heart a million times. After my father took his own life, Mama became a single mother. She struggled to make ends meet, cleaning condos. I threw my education away and dropped out of school. I helped pay rent.

As a teenager, I took my piano and guitar into dens of iniquity. I played in beer joints because I've had a lifelong love affair with Willie Nelson. I sang cheating songs and drinking songs that shamed my mother.

By the time I was a married man, I was a loser without a high-school diploma. I had no pot to you-know-what in, and no proverbial window to throw it out of.

I was a construction worker. I hung gutter. I scooped ice cream. I flipped burgers. I even did a short stint as a telemarketer.

In my late 20s, I decided I



wanted to go to college. My mother paid for my first class. It cost her almost \$100 for the first semester. That was a lot of money for a cleaning lady.

The first class I took was Creative Writing. The first essay I wrote was about a woman named Mama. The essay had water spots on it when I turned it in.

That one essay would change my life. Writing itself would change my life. Writing would lead me into producing newspaper columns. Which would lead me into doing speaking engagements. Which led to doing a one-man musical show, where I would tell stories and play an old Gibson guitar.

Over the last decade, I have taken this pitiful one-man show to 39 different U.S. states. I have played Mama's guitar all over the Union. And just yesterday morning, my wife got an email.

My wife read this email aloud.

"Dear Sean and Jamie," the letter read, "The Grand Ole Opry' would be thrilled if Sean would appear on the show... Please let us know some dates that might work for you."

I cried. My wife cried. My God. This had to be a joke. But it wasn't.

The first person I texted was Mama. There were streams running down my cheeks as I thumb-typed on my phone.

In only point-two nanoseconds, my mother responded: "That's Mama's little musician," she wrote.

So, here's to the woman who changed my diapers at the feet of the Oak Ridge Boys; who introduced me to Minnie Pearl; who made me what I am; who foolishly believed in her failure of a son, even when nobody else did, not even himself. Happy birthday, Mama.

desire to be right intersect with an unrelenting dogmatism? In other words, "my" interpretation of the facts is correct.

Chuck was someone in my neighborhood who was a bit "off," maybe creepy. Chuck encountered me once and asked how old I was; at the time I was 13 or 14. He remarked at my above average height at such a young age. He asked, "how many older and elderly people do you see that are tall?" Without my answering he answered for me, "none," adding that the key to a long life for me was going to be not growing much more and that there were ways to stunt growth. Part pleading my case, part seeking an elegant reason to escape this engagement, he held my company for first 15, then 30 minutes before I backed away having been captive to his diatribe for more than an hour. Dogmatic, he was.

Even at my young and impressionable time to me his tenet seemed flawed. I knew enough then to realize that as people aged, vertebra compressed, stooping occurred due to arthritic conditions and as a result naturally people would lose verticality.

Obviously, many years later Chuck's message still sticks, but was it effective? At a young age I concluded his wisdom was not so sage and moreover he was a bit of a kook.

Similar to being right we strive too for effectiveness. Again, our nature is to encourage and convince others to see the world from our viewpoint. We rely on a variety of tools ranging from gentle persuasion to argument and sometimes confrontation. Some seek compromise, a tact that has more recently seemed belittled. Compromise insinuates a softening of values and beliefs, a conformance to what's accepted or popular.

Recently an individual was talking to me about an important person in their life. In discussing a point of contention between the two of them she offered that "he just doesn't understand." I heard the conflict then. How I thought to myself why she didn't instead say, "our viewpoints are different," or "we come from different directions?" Instead, to a casual observer, their exchange came across as "I'm right, you're wrong," usually not a good starting point for détente.


I seeking a formula for resolving the stress between rightness and effectiveness, the best remedy I've discovered comes from the most ancient of words, using it as a test for assessing the efficacy of relationship, leadership, and trustworthiness. Is there a demonstration of love, joy, peace, patience, and kindness expressed? Is the action generous, faithful, and gentle? Is there self-control?

These characteristics worthy of ascription come from the book of Galatians in the New Testament of the Bible. Inarguable characteristics, I would think, BOTH right and effective.

As we launch into this New Year, I'm resolving to make a more intensive effort to gravitate towards and live out these attributes.




Restaurant Review: San Marcos is a Sensory Delight



The Healing Benefits of Music

Playing an instrument or listening to music have numerous benefits for our health. Music has the power to influence our mood, reduce stress and anxiety, enhance cognitive function, and even improve physical health.

A 2020 study, found that 57% of Americans use music as a form of stress reduction, compared to just 40% who find exercise helpful, so the stress-relieving benefits of music are definitely no secret.

Music Can Improve Your Physical Health

Music can have a positive impact on physical health, particularly in the areas of pain management, sleep quality, and cardiovascular health. Listening to relaxing music before bed

can help to improve sleep quality, which is important for optimum healing of injuries, and for muscle growth. Listening to up-tempo music (especially while exercising) has been shown to increase heart rate and blood flow, improving cardiovascular health and our motivation levels.



Homeowners' Frequently Asked Questions

What does R-value mean? R-value measures insulation's resistance to heat flow. It can also be referred to as "thermal resistance." The higher the Rvalue, the greater the insulating power. All materials having the same R-value, regardless of type, thickness, or weight are equal in insulating power. Don't forget that R-values are determined by material type, thickness, and installed weight per square foot, not by thickness alone. Insulation helps keep your home cool during the summer months and warm during the winter months.

How much will I save by adding insulation to the walls, ceilings and floors of my home? Insulation saves money, increases your home's comfort and protects the environment by reduc-

ing energy use. According to the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE) shows that typically 44 percent of a homeowner's utility bill goes for heating and cooling costs. DOE also states that homeowners may be able to reduce their energy bills from 10 percent to 50 percent by taking certain steps. One of the major steps is increasing the amount of thermal insulation in their existing homes or purchasing additional insulation when building new homes. Unless your home was constructed with special attention to energy efficiency, adding insulation will reduce your utility bills. The amount of energy you conserve will depend on several factors: climate, size, shape and construction of your house, your living habits, the type and efficiency of the heating and cooling systems and the fuel you use. Energy conserved is money saved

when utility rates go up, which many of us are experiencing. Insulation upgrades also instantly add value to your home and are a great investment. The Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 allows homeowners to claim significant tax credits for adding qualifying insulation products. Some projects qualify for 30 percent of the project up to \$1,200. (Consult your tax professional for details)

How much insulation should I have? "Insulation," says Bob Vila, "is the most efficient energy-saving expenditure." Energy Star and ECES agree and recommend R-38 or about 10 to 14.5 inches, depending on the insulation type. Many homes we inspect are under-insulated. Even new homes only meet the minimum requirement of R-30. If your insulation is below R-30 or if your insulation is just level with or below floor joists, you should add more insulation. Take the



time to understand how much insulation you have by using a measuring tape or have a professional inspect your home and offer available options and savings.


What words should I watch out for in contracts or job estimates? Once you have chosen an insulation contractor, make sure the contract includes the job specification, cost and warranty information. The contract should list the type of insulation to be used and where it will be used. Make sure that each type of insulation is listed by R-value. Beware of any contract or verbal offering that quotes the job in terms of thickness only (e.g., "14 inches of insulation"). Remember, it is the R-value, not the thickness that tells how well a material insulates. Avoid contracts with vague language with the terms "plus or minus," "+ or -,"; "average," or "nominal." Also ask for before and after pictures. The installation team should be installing measuring sticks in the attic to determine the proper R-value.

Is there anything other than insulation to increase comfort and efficiency? There are several innovative materials in the market that are not widely used by most insulation contractors. ERG window film is a smart tint material which can be applied to glass and is virtually clear. This film blocks 65 percent of solar gain heat and 99.9 percent of UV rays, protecting floors, furniture, you and pets from the damaging sun's UV. Some common applications would be any room with direct sunlight; sunrooms and offices are great areas to add ERG films. Another great product is Radiant Barrier, which is a reflective material installed in attic spaces which blocks 97 percent of radiant heat, reducing your overall attic temperature by 40 to 50 degrees in the summer. By reducing your attics heat signature, you increase your comfort and your insulation and HVAC systems work less, saving you money and extending the life of HVAC systems. Radiant Barrier systems should be installed on rafters, just under your roof line and should not be installed lying on top of your insulation.

There are many ways to save energy and become more energy efficient. The first step is understanding where and how your home is losing energy and then taking steps to increase comfort and save money.


