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

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nomination are you, and we let them know we're from different churches and it really disarms people."



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# Flood Water Mosquitoes!!!

With the recent rain events mammals, including livestock here in South Walton, residents have become concerned with the influence of

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nuisance mosquitoes. There are a few species of mosquitoes, we call Floodwater species. These mosquitoes usually show up about 2 weeks after a big rain event and continue

to show up in our traps until the end of summer. This gives them plenty of time to lay more eggs for the following year.

Floodwater mosquitoes lay their eggs in the soil of lower areas of land that will hold water after a rain event. These eggs are laid individually, by the hundreds, and can lay dormant for 3 years. Once water is introduced, it causes large amounts of mosquitoes to emerge all at once. Some prefer dry woodland pools, ditches, grassy fields, or farmlands which make them difficult to control. Due to the variety of habitats of these mosquitoes, our best defense is county wide larvicide missions. This is when the mosquito control trucks will treat ditches and any area, they can reach from the roadside with a truck mounted hose and treatment to kill mosquitoes in their immature phase.

As the adults emerge, there are many reasons they become so apparent to us for a few weeks after a rain event. For one, they are aggressive people biters. They prefer blood meals from and people. They will stay close to the areas where they have

access to these blood meals, usually resting in a shaded area. Second, they are mainly active during the day, which is when most

people are outside and being bitten.

Even though there is an influx of mosquitoes, the floodwater species are not considered an "important vector" species meaning they do not normally pass mosquito-borne diseases to people.

They are also difficult to control as adults, due to their most active time being during the day. Mosquito controls in Florida do not treat with adulticide trucks during the day for a few reasons, unless there is a public health emergency. One main reason is to protect pollinators. Another reason is during the day, heat makes the adulticide treatment lighter and will make it float away. There is a temperature inversion at dusk and dawn that holds the products closer to the ground and allows our treatments to do what they are designed to do.

The best defense against the day-time biters is to practice the 5 D's of protection against mosquitoes:

Drain - Many mosquito problems in your neighborhood are likely to come from water that you, the resident, can help

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
to eliminate. All mosquitoes need water in which to breed. Be sure to drain any standing water around your house.


Dress - Wear light-colored, loose-fitting clothing. Many of the 176 mosquito species are attracted to dark clothing and some can bite through tightfitting clothes. When practical, wear long sleeves and pants.

Dusk to Dawn - Avoid mosquito mealtimes - early evening to early morning hours. If at all possible, avoid outdoor activities during these times.

Defend - Choose a mosquito repellent that has been registered by the Environmental Protection Agency, such as DEET, Picaridin, or oil of lemon eucalyptus. Registered products have been reviewed, approved, and pose minimal risk for human safety when used according to label directions.



# Insights for Investors: Past, Present and Future in Investing

"If you want to know the past, look at your present. If you want to know the future, look at your present" – Marcus Aurelius

Reports came out this past week over the continued resilience of the U.S. economy. GDP growth for the second quarter was 2.4 percent. According to the Associated Press, that was led by a strong increase in business spending and continued strength in consumer spending. This is in the face of 11 federal rate hikes in the past 17 months. Inflation has continued to decline and is now down almost 70 percent in the past 12 months.

We have seen it before in the quote from the great John Templeton: The four most expensive words in investing are: "This time it's different." Indeed, we agree, and this time it is not different. The stock market sank to its lowest level in October 2022. It has since rebounded quite substantially. That is right in line with past slowdowns or declines in earnings brought on by higher interest rates, inflation, and a slowing economy.

It has been interesting and concerning at the same time, the rapid rise in inflation over most of 2022. And what goes up often comes down - we have seen inflation come down 70 percent over the past 12 months. Raymond James, in its most recent edition of "Investment Strategy Quarterly" presents two scenarios which can drive inflation: Supply push inflation or demand push inflation. Inflation pushed by an interruption or decrease in production can raise prices. Stimulated demand brought on by a significant increase in the money supply can drive inflation. We may have just experienced the two simultaneously.

The interesting thing about inflation is that it was mostly nonexistent from 2010 to 2020. That was with an abundant supply of money and a strong economy for the most part. How could inflation have been so tame? Goldman Sachs points out that two key factors were 1) the low cost of energy during that time and 2) the continued advances in automation and other technological innovations that drove the cost of doing business out of the system. It was quite incredible to see the low cost of money and low inflation. The question, as we hear nonstop communication about artificial intelligence, or AI, is that about to happen again and at an even faster rate? The impact of technological advances cannot be overstated in our opinion. They not only drive costs out of the system as Goldman points out, but they also create new opportunities, industries, and jobs. Of course, some jobs go away (think telephone operators or typists) but are typically replaced by more and higherpaying jobs. Is the market seeing that? We think so. Goldman Sachs also shared some numbers to further illustrate these points. In 1850, two thirds of the workforce was devoted to agriculture or food production. The leading cause of death at that time was malnutrition. Today, less than 2 percent of the workforce is dedicated to food production and productivity, or output, has never been greater. One of the leading causes of death today is a diet that is too rich.

Even though most stocks are up only slightly in 2023, many of these companies are coming out of earnings slumps and, like past growth spurts in stocks, they have recovered after hitting lows. The markets, however, present a different picture. At this writing the S&P 500 index is up almost 19 percent ytd, the Dow, 6.5 percent and the NAS-DAQ, 35 percent. Investors should take note that a small number of stocks, fewer than 10, have driven most of the performance of S&P and the NAS-DAQ. Taking those out leaves those indexes with a much dif-

ferent result.

The same can be said for so-called market valuation: looking at the price to earnings ratio (PE) of the S&P. Historically, that number has been 16 to 1. Most recently it is 26 to 1, indicating a somewhat overvalued market. If you experiment and take out the small number of outperforming stocks, you will find that ratio drops down somewhat, making it slightly undervalued. Throughout most of July, the market seemed to be responding to that and the larger group of stocks performed quite strongly and many of those firms have been reporting their second quarter results, which are proving to be better than expected.

We are also encouraging investors to look more closely at bonds or fixed income investments. If the Fed is close to or at the end of its rate hike efforts and if inflation continues to wane, locking in yields for longer term than short-term CDs and money markets might make a lot of sense. It can diversify or reduce risk to a portfolio, and it can be a source of income as well. 



Take yourself back in time. It's sweltering and dusty. The sun beats down and your sandals kick up dirt. The Temple looms large, its massive stone columns and steps filled with people going about their business. The smell of penned sheep and goats mingle with the scent of spices and fruit. And the heat is suffocating.



Being a background extra on the set of the globally popular TV series The Chosen for four days filming Season 4's finale was, in a word, memorable. The Jerusalem set in Goshen, Utah is spectacular. The stone walls are imposing. And when the sun

kisses them late in the day, they turn pink. There were 600 of us dressed

as first century Jews, Greeks, and Nabateans sweating in the sun, drinking tons of water, and smiling in between takes, just because.

We arrived at 6:15 am, the crew checked us in, and we were given lanyards dividing us up into 5 teams. Oh, and to make a note - we were strictly forbidden to divulge any specifics on the actual scenes being filmed. While we waited for our turn on set, we sat in a spacious air-conditioned holding tent, stocked with water, juices, sodas, snacks and electrolytes, not to mention breakfast, lunch and a box dinner handed out at the end of a 12-hour day. We were well taken care of as we sat around getting to know each other.

I mentioned the heat. It was in the upper 90s each day, and although the humidity is lower there than here, when that sun is beating down on you it feels like a laser boring into your brain. So, we used umbrellas and sunglasses in between takes. There was a lot of waiting and when it was the most uncomfortable, a wonderful young man, dressed as a Jewish peasant, walked around spritzing us in the face with water. He was quite popular, being the one who made everyone feel better even if only for a minute or two.

When our color group was called and we arrived on set, Mitch, the 2nd 2nd Assistant Director, gave us instructions and taught us some new ABCs - Always Be Crossing. That means, when "Background!" is called out, you never stop moving until you hear "Cut!" Seeing the actors up close was amazing, although we weren't allowed to make eye contact or approach them since they were in character, although I did make sure I walked near Jesus (Jonathan Roumie) for a few of the takes so I could hear him deliver his lines (which were awesome, by the way). Everyone was sweating and uncomfortable, and gracious. The actors would joke a little with each other as we all waited.

"Pictures up!" Time to put everything that wasn't first century approved away in our bags.

"Rolling, rolling!" Get ready. "Background!" Our cue to start walking or shoving or milling around.

"Action!" Now the actors begin delivering their lines while background continues backgrounding without looking at the actors.

"Cut!" Everyone stops in



their tracks.

"Reset!" Everyone goes back to where they started. And we do it again. And again. And again. Until Dallas Jenkins is happy with the shot.

By the end of day 4, my feet were blistered and my toes were rubbed raw. My nose and shoulders were sunburned, and I was exhausted. But it was worth every uncomfortable moment.

When you think about it, a film set is a microcosm of the body of Christ. Each person has their part. Some parts are bigger or more visible than others. But the scene wouldn't be complete without everyone's participation. The actors need background extras to make the scenes realistic.



The camera operators need not just the actors and background extras, but the props to make the picture authentic. Everyone needs the staff and crew to set up the props and clean up the set and provide the food and the water and the umbrellas and so much more. The Director is needed to oversee and direct, instruct and troubleshoot the entire production.

We are all necessary, no matter what part we have been assigned to play.

There are 3 more seasons to film, and if I could, I would be a permanent BG extra and move to Texas, where most of the filming is done. We'll have to wait and see what happens.



# **Underwater Museum of Art Expands**

It may have been a cloudy and rainy day, but the UMA deployment team was all smiles last week as six new sculptures were added to the nation's first permanent Underwater Museum of Art (UMA) in the Gulf of Mexico off the coast of Grayton Beach State Park in South Walton, Fla.

Named by TIME Magazine as one of 100 "World's Greatest Places," the UMA is the first presentation of the Cultural Arts Alliance of Walton County (CAA)'s Art In Public Spaces Program and is produced in collaboration with the South Walton Artificial Reef Association (SWARA). The purpose of the UMA is to create art that becomes marine habitat, expanding fishery populations and providing enhanced creative, cultural, economic and educational opportunities for the benefit, education and enjoyment of residents, students and visitors in South Walton.

The 2023 installation includes the following pieces of sculpture: Quantum Reef by Chris Chubb (Tallahassee, FL), Space Nest by Frank Henderson (Evanston, IL), Welcome Home by Zachery Long (Oklahoma City, OK), Cetacean Remains by Pat Mclain (Stone Mountain, GA), One Tree by Ann Moeller Steverson (Huntsville, AL) Opus by Allison Wickey (Santa Rosa Beach, FL).

On July 13th, more than 75

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onlookers, including several of the artists and project partners, were on site to view the historic deployment. New this year, the team was able to livestream all of the action to the UMA website and is still available for viewing at umafl.org.



This installation joins the 34 sculptures previously deployed on a one-acre permit patch of seabed off Grayton Beach State Park, expanding the nation's first permanent underwater museum to a total of 40 sculptures. The UMA patch will continue to be filled with several new sculptures annually.

"The UMA installation is always awe inspiring and this year was no exception. The collaboration amongst all of the groups and individuals who make the deployment happen annually is incredible," said CAA Executive Director Jennifer Steele. "As the UMA continues to expand, the CAA is grateful for the excitement and dedication of the artists, fabricators, deployment team and partners. We are so proud to work alongside project co-founders Allison Wickey and SWARA to build this unique environment for creativity and education."

"This year's UMA deployment was one for the books,' said SWARA President and Dive30A owner Walt Hartley. "These six new sculptures will truly enrich the personality and character of the Museum. It was also our very first time livestreaming the full deployment online so folks all around the world were able to watch! 'Cetacean Remains' is definitely going to become a diver's favorite with its fantastic swimthrough. Fish began to congregate around all the sculptures almost immediately. 'If you build it, they will come!' With 40 total sculptures now, the Underwater Museum of Art is really coming into its own, and it's been nothing short of inspirational to watch it grow over the years. None of this would be possible without the continued support



from our community, the WalterMarine/Reefmaker Crew, and our collaborative partnership with the Cultural Arts Alliance of Walton County. Big thanks to all involved! We can't wait to do it again next year!"

Admission to the UMA is free, however, the site is only accessible in person as a dive location. Divers who wish to visit the site can take a dive boat .93 miles off the coast of Grayton Beach State Park. The coordinates for the new Super Reef UMA entrance are N 30°18.754 / W 86°09.521. Out of respect for the art, boaters are asked to anchor on or near the Super Reef Anchor Point to protect the sculptures from unintended contact or damage.

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## **Journey Bravely; Tackling Transition**

When did you last experience tense shoulders, sighing breaths, irritability, exhaustion, trying to keep it positive, being overscheduled and overwhelmed? It's back to school transition time and August tends to sneak up each year with an unending list of buying things and attending events for the new school year. Back to school is only one of many transitional times. Sometimes, you

experience major transitions such as moving homes, starting college, adding children to the family, changing jobs, divorce, or loss. Other times, you experience regular life transitions like starting middle school, changing schedules, school breaks, or daylight savings time. Regardless of the brand, transition tends to disrupt physical and emotional routines leaving you confused, less productive, and stressed. Transition is an inevitable certainty of life, but, what can you do to manage stress effectively in the process?

8 Ways to Manage Transitional Stress

1. Notice and acknowledge the presence of stress. Listen to your body. Pay attention to bodily sensations, thoughts, and behavior you connect with stress such as tension, headaches, stomachaches, energy level, obsessive worry, irritability, heart rate, sweating, sighing, grumping, sleep problems, or pessimism.

2. Look for life transitions to connect with stress. Notice your recent life circumstances that could be contributing to stress. Are you walking through a major or regular life change? Is someone you love going through a life change? Do the changes feel out of your control? Name the transition and remind yourself stress in transition is normal. You may not have control over the circumstances but you do have control over how you care for yourself.

**3. Acknowledge mixed feelings that accompany life transitions.** Some transitions feel primarily sad. Most transitions create both excitement for the new future reality and grief to leave the previous way behind. Give yourself space to hold conflicting emotions and remind yourself it's normal and okay to feel confused.

4. Engage in intentional, more frequent self care. Talk to a trusted person about your feelings, go for a walk, take a nap, create art, go for a run. Engage in activities that feel caring and calming as regularly as possible during transitional times.

**5. Set boundaries where possible.** Reduce unnecessary commitments. Say no to new commitments. Lower any excessively high or perfectionistic expectations you have for yourself. Prioritize rest. Less is more during times of stress.


**6. Plan ahead for repetitive transitions**. Make lists and use calendars for transitions like school starting to remind yourself not to procrastinate needed tasks.

**7. Mindfully do one thing at a time.** As you walk through the necessary tasks during life stress, try not to overthink or get ahead of yourself. Plan far enough to be responsible then focus on what you are doing right now, today. Be present in the moment knowing each moment builds into a history of you moving through and out of your current transitional stress.

8. Accept and don't judge. Transition is inevitable. Stress happens. Notice the transition and the stress without judging yourself or the circumstance. Engage in healthy self-control and do what you can to practice health. Remember where you have power to act rather than viewing yourself as a victim which creates more stress. Your body and brain will adjust to the new normal over time.

# South Walton Junior Lifeguard Program building community-wide surf rescue culture

In South Walton, the summertime wave of enthusiasm for surf rescue is undeniably contagious.

This wave first started building 20 years ago, when the Emerald Coast experienced one of its darkest days, known locally as Black Sunday. Numerous people fatally drowned due to rough surf and rip currents along a coastline where professional lifeguard programs were not yet established.

The community desperately needed a change, and public safety agencies along the coast began cultivating resources and implementing beach safety programs. Fast-forward to 2008, when a few dozen of South Walton's youngest community members took a chance and participated in the first-ever South Walton Fire District (SWFD) Junior Lifeguard Program.

Their community was lacking general knowledge and respect for safety in the open water, but their willingness to learn created a ripple at the right time for a successful and strong initiative to grow.

Fifteen years later, more than 150 children, ages 9-16 years old, spend weeks of their summer learning what it takes to protect a beach community that boasts more than 6 million annual visitors.

"As soon as we think we have reached the limit of potential interest in our program, it explodes with popularity once again," said SWFD Beach Safety Director David Vaughan. "We have seen record registration numbers now for several years in a row without doing much advertising. The community has embraced us. The demand for this program is leaps and bounds beyond what most of us ever expected."

The SWFD Junior Lifeguard Program not only experienced massive registration numbers in 2023, but it also evolved to offer a pathway to future employment for its oldest participants.

For the first time, 16-year-old junior lifeguards had the opportunity to participate and earn their Open Water Lifeguard Certification through SWFD Beach Safety and the United States Lifesaving Association (USLA).

SWFD's goal through this certification process is to make the transition from junior lifeguard to professional lifeguard as seamless as possible. Once a certified junior lifeguard turns 17-years-old, they can move from the summer program into a paid lifeguarding job with SWFD Beach Safety.

"My experience as a Junior Lifeguard on the Emerald Coast is a major reason why I considered a job in surf rescue after college," said SWFD Beach Safety Lieutenant and Program Instructor Brandon Brown. "The Junior Lifeguard Program is our chance to shape the future of beach safety. Along with that, it gives kids a fun way to spend their summer while making friends and enjoying the beach."

The current program consists of two, three-week sessions throughout June and July. Brown and the cohort of program instructors- Lifeguards Cameron Clements, Joey Strubhar, Erin Hartsel, and Rory Leaf- create hours of training activities for the participants based on the day's surf conditions. The training aims to test not only a junior lifeguard's physical abilities, but also their mental stamina and character.

At the conclusion of the threeweek program, the junior lifeguards develop an irreplaceable skill set that will serve them well for the rest of their life on the Gulf Coast. They can identify and explain rip currents, rescue




swimmers in distress, understand and follow the beach flag warning system, perform CPR and lifesaving first aid, and swim confidently in the open water.

"Ultimately, we want these kids to take what they have learned and tell their friends, tell their families, tell people who they have never met before if they are down at the beach and see people getting into trouble," explained Director Vaughan. "We are reaching these children at an impressionable and crucial time in their lives, they develop the confidence they need to be difference makers in our community and advocate for beach safety."

Despite the growth of local junior lifeguard programs, the understanding of the value of beach safety efforts is still growing along the Emerald Coast. Adversity comes nearly every summer for area public safety agencies when millions of people who are unfamiliar with the innate hazards of open water flock to Emerald Coast beaches. It only takes a few weeks of this tourism bump for drowning fatalities to begin splashing across local and national news headlines.

Families visiting the area ultimately return home without a loved one in tow, despite relentless messaging from local lifeguards about the dangers of rip currents, swimming near a lifeguard, and the beach flag warning system.

It is the smiling face of an exuberant junior lifeguard, covered in sand and breathless while begging for another round of practice rescues, that serves as an inspiring reminder for even the most seasoned surf rescue professionals that the future of beach safety is in capable hands.

## **Pros and Cons of Medicare Advantage Plans**

Will you be turning 65 this year? For people becoming Medicare eligible for the first time, making choices regarding healthcare moving forward can feel overwhelming. To receive comprehensive coverage, for most people, there are two main buckets to choose from: Enroll in Medicare Parts A&B and add a Medigap and Prescription Drug Plan (along with their premiums) to make up for what Medicare does not cover, or enroll in A&B and then switch to a Medicare Advantage plan. As of last year, over 45% of Medicare beneficiaries chose a Medicare Advantage plan, and expectations are that number will rise to more than 50%by 2025. So what are some of the pros and cons of Advantage plans?

First for the pros: Advantage plans offer simplicity. Both medical and prescription drugs are covered under the same plan. Sticking with original Medicare requires the purchase of a Supplement/Medigap plan plus an additional PDP plan in order to get comprehensive coverage. Beneficiaries continue to pay the Medicare Part B premium, \$164.90 for most in 2023, either way

Medicare Advantage plans are typically low or \$0 premium plans, so they appear less expensive. Additionally, unlike original Medicare, Advantage plans max out-of-pocket expenses. In 2023, excluding prescriptions, HMO plans in our area max out between \$3500-4900 in network. You'll pay more if you have a PPO plan and use out-of-network providers. A Medigap and PDP plan added to traditional Medicare includes an additional monthly premium for each. With a Medigap (also called a Supplement) plan, after monthly premiums are paid there is generally very little additional cost, depending on the plan chosen.

Advantage plans often offer benefits that traditional Medicare cannot offer. Limited vision, dental, and/or hearing benefits are often included in Advantage plans as well as additional perks like gym memberships, transportation, or over-the-counter benefits that vary from plan to plan. Medigap plans do not offer these perks or services at all.

On the downside, most Advantage plans are HMO plans, and pre-authorizations may be required for many procedures and some prescription drugs. So your doctor may recommend more care, but the plan can limit what it approves. This doesn't happen with traditional Medicare, supplemented or not.

Patients with higher needs or chronic conditions are often inclined to stick with traditional Medicare as they generally have better access to the best hospitals and cancer centers. Advantage plan members are half as likely to use the highest-rated cancer centers for complex surgeries than similar patients in their zip code. Over 90% of physicians nationwide accept traditional Medicare, though fewer and fewer are accepting new Medicare patients. This will likely continue to decline as reimbursement rates paid by Medicare to physicians are set to reduce even further this year while Advantage plans are being given more funding by the federal government.

"Jesus said to his disciples: 'Things that cause people to sin are bound to come, but woe to that person through whom they come. It would be better for him to be thrown into the sea with a millstone tied around his neck than for him to cause one of these little ones to sin. So watch yourselves.<sup>3</sup>

"If your brother sins, rebuke him, and if he repents, forgive him.

#### If he sins against you seven times in a day, and seven times comes back

clutches of my trap. Christ warns His disciples in Luke 17:1-10 concerning the nasty trap of temptation.

The Greek word Christ uses for "sin" in this passage is scandalon, referring to the part of the trap where you attach the bait. It means "offense," or "snare" and describes the behaviors that provoke others to sin.

Christ's indictment is not on the sinner as much as the person who causes someone to stumble. He says it would be better for that person to have a millstone hung around their neck and thrown into the sea than to cause someone to falter. Judgment awaits those peo-

Jesus warns us because our behavior can lead people to the Lord or drive them away. I think there are few Christians who wake up in the morning asking themselves, "How can I tempt others to sin today?" But people scrutinize our behavior every day, watching how we behave. Will they see real Christianity in action?

What about when you are the offended person? What do you do when you are tempted or hurt? The idea of forgiving the people who offended them overwhelmed the disciples. Forgive them seven times a day? Was Christ kidding?

No, Jesus wasn't kidding. Jesus shows them the liberating power of forgiveness released through faith. Even faith as tiny as a mustard seed.

Jesus is saying He came to forgive all who come to Him. If you follow Jesus, you will need to learn to forgive. If you have enough faith to believe in the Lord, you have enough faith to forgive others. Forgiveness sets people free and displays real Christianity for all to see.

Rebecca Pippert tells the story in her book "Out of the Salt Shaker and Into the World," concerning one man's demonstration of thoughtful love. She knew a young man named Bill who had become a Christian on her college campus in Oregon. He was a free spirit with long, messy hair, who never wore shoes, ever. Snow, sleet,

or rain - he walked barefoot.

Bill soon attended the church across the street from the campus. He walked into the rather formal church wearing denim jeans, a Tshirt, and his signature look - no shoes. As he walked down the center aisle looking for a seat in the crowded church, none was available. So, he squatted down on the floor near the front pew as the service was about to begin.

Unnerved, the church people didn't know what to do. Tension hung in the air as an elderly member began walking down the aisle toward the boy. What would he do? Scold him? Offer him his seat? Ask the young man to leave? All eyes focused on the silent drama unfolding before them.

The old man lumbered down the aisle, and when he reached Bill, he awkwardly plopped down on the carpet next to him. They worshiped together on the floor as people witnessed real love fleshed out before them. The elderly gentleman did what Christ would do in that situation, and it enveloped everyone in the loving arms of God.

We want our lives to draw people to Christ, to catch them in the net of God's grace rather than the death-like snap of evil's trap. We can choose to live in the grip of grace rather than temptation.

# The Road to Redemption: Jason and Casey Draughn – A Journey of Fostering

"Follow Me." Those were lifechanging words to the Twelve Disciples. Each one heard the invitation, and each one answered. But what did those words really mean to those men? They walked away from their professions and homes, friends and ambitions. They traded their dreams for Jesus. And they eventually gave the ultimate – their lives.

One of the many children they fostered was a 15 year old

girl who had endured horrendous abuse. She was only with them for a few months, then ended up moving from one group home to another. Casey was there for the birth of this young woman's son, who chose life for him in very difficult circumstances. Jason and Casey refer to themselves as this little one's grandparents.

And the young mother is now an advocate for children in care. She's using her voice for others.

Casey remembers how, over the years, they would reach out to friends at church for help and they would show up laden with food and clothes. "We couldn't have done it without the help of our friends."

The need for more foster families is great – in the nine years Jason and Casey have been fostering, the number of foster homes has not increased in Walton County. "These children need the love of Jesus. God said – don't guard your heart with them. Love them as I love you. Cover them with prayer."

I can imagine the smile on God's face as He watched Jason and Casey bringing these precious broken and hurting children to church to hear about Jesus, throwing birthday parties to celebrate their lives, and spending time eating meals together. God desires a relationship – with Himself and us with each other.

We already know that children have a special place in Jesus' heart. "I love how God does a hundred things in the one thing. Pray about being a foster parent, but don't let that be an excuse to hold you back."

I closed my eyes. All of a sudden, I was in my father's garage. Holding a GI Joe doll. Watching a skinny man. He was alive again, and he was beautiful. Even if only in my memory. He was happy. And so was I.

going to do. I am convinced that the odds of business and personal success multiply dramatically by just this one credo. - Exceed expectations. Guys, if we're cooking dinner for our spouses, include some flowers with the table setting. Gals, you treat for the dinner date and movie sometime. Neighbors, prepare an extra batch for dinner tonight to deliver to someone who may be ill or "shut in" down the street. Younger people, what about a technology lesson for that same person?
- **Time.** Many of us are overscheduled and each day's greatest challenge is to stay on task and complete our "To Do" lists. Yet, someone who just walked through the doors of your store needs to be listened to more than sold something. Your teenager may simply want you to watch a TV

show with them. A long-time friend would love to hear the sound of your voice and to share a few laughs; call them.

Fred Rogers, AKA Mr. Rogers said, "If you could only sense how important you are to the lives of those you meet; how important you can be to the people you may never even dream of. There is something of yourself that you leave at every meeting with another person."


# **30AEats.com Recipe of the Month:** Red Rice

Cast-iron pots and pans have a long-standing tradition in American cookery, and Lodge Cast Iron has stood the test of time. I completed a project with this great company for The Lodge Cast Iron Cookbook-Cooking from Coast to Coast,

that includes two of my recipes. Chef Steven Satterfield made this recipe for Red Rice using Carolina Gold, an heirloom variety of long-grain rice that is hand-harvested by its producer Anson Mills. Sautéing the rice in fat for a good five minutes helps to infuse flavor into the individual grains. Lastly, no peeking while the rice is cooking the covered cast-iron pot is key to the development of the crust





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#### on the bottom."

You can order Carolina Gold Rice from Anson Mills, or give this dish a whirl using your favorite paella rice.

Red Rice featured in The Lodge Cast Iron Cookbook Serves: 6

#### Ingredients:

4 tablespoons bacon drippings

5 tablespoons butter

1 small yellow onion, diced

1 cup diced celery (inner leaves included)

2 garlic cloves, minced

2 tablespoons plus 1 teaspoon kosher salt (or more to taste)

2 cups canned organic whole plum tomatoes (undrained and chopped)

2 cups chicken stock

2 tablespoons pepper vinegar or cider vinegar (if you use cider vinegar, add a pinch of red pepper flakes)

1 1/4 teaspoons freshly ground black pepper

3/4 teaspoon dried thyme

2 bay leaves

2 dried chiles de arbol, chopped (or a pinch of red pepper flakes)

2 cups long-grain rice, such as Carolina Gold

3/4 pound andouille or chorizo sausage, grilled and sliced 1/2inch thick

1 1/2 pounds shrimp (peeled, deveined, and cut into bitesized pieces)

#### Instructions:

In a medium saucepan over medium heat, melt 2 tablespoons bacon drippings and 2 tablespoons butter. Add the onion, celery, garlic, and 1 tablespoon salt. Cook, stirring often, until the onion and garlic are tender. Add the tomatoes, chicken stock, vinegar, 1 tablespoon salt, and 1 teaspoon black pepper, along with the thyme, bay leaves, and chiles. Simmer for 15 to 20 minutes, tasting for seasoning.

In a large cast-iron skillet over medium heat, add remaining 2 tablespoons bacon drippings and 2 tablespoons butter and cook until foamy. Add the rice and cook, stirring frequently, until it is opaque (about 5 minutes). This step is very important to the final flavor of the dish, so don't skimp on the time — but also don't let the rice burn.

Add 4 cups of the tomato mixture to the rice. Stir and cover. Set a timer and cook the rice for 25 minutes over very low heat. Do not lift the lid. After 25 minutes, turn off the heat and let the rice stand for 5 more minutes. Again, do not lift the lid. While the rice cooks, add the sausage to the remaining tomato mixture in the pan. Cover and keep warm over very low heat.

While the rice stands, in a medium sauté pan over medium-high heat, melt the remaining 1 tablespoon butter until foamy. Add the shrimp, stirring just until cooked through. Add the remaining 1 teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon black pepper. Combine the shrimp to the sausage and tomato mixture. Stir well.

Pour the shrimp and sausage mixture over the rice. Remove and discard bay leaves. Without breaking the grains, gently fluff the rice. Serve immediately.





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# Studio 237 Music Lessons: Promote Balance and Harmony

We're all hoping to provide our children with a well-rounded education which not only reaps the benefits of technical subjects, like math and science, but also nurtures essential life skills and personal growth. An undeniably powerful tool to help achieve this goal is to include music lessons in one's day-to-day learning. Let's explore how the study of music can help bring balance into a student's educational experience.

### 1. Embellishes Learning

By far, the best thing about music lessons is that they are unlike any other subject in school. Students get to take a break from their daily class routine, relax a little, and tap into their creativity.

Music classes provide a nurturing environment for students to be more social. When children participate in group activities like choir, orchestra, or band, they learn the value of teamwork, cooperation, communication, plus have a chance to make new friends.

#### 2. Synergizes the 3 R's

Despite being uniquely different from typical classroom subjects, music naturally incorporates the use of other academic skills to give the brain a full workout. Learning how to play a musical instrument (including voice) activates the brain's neural pathways associated with language, problem-solving, critical-thinking, and more. Studies reveal that students engaged in music programs perform better in reading, writing, and arithmetic compared to those who are not.

#### 3. Physical Coordination

Playing an instrument involves bilateral coordination, where both hands, fingers, or feet work independently. A study on the fine motor skills of children after two years of piano lessons found significant improvements compared to those who didn't receive lessons. The development of strong fine motor skills opens up pathways to careers which require "an eye" for physical detail such as: jewelers, electricians, mechanics, painters, architects, doctors and surgeons.



#### Getting Started with Lessons

There's no wrong time to begin learning an instrument, however, we recommend age 6 and up. Here are three ideas to guide you towards a harmonious result:

**1. Explore Your Child's Interests:** Observe what instru-


ments or musical styles they're naturally drawn to. You can try listening to different genres together, visit a music store, or attend a live musical performance either locally at a restaurant, school, church, special event, or at a concert hall. So, as you enter this new school year, consider creating a balance in your child's educational plan with music lessons.






