In 2022, 265 Walton County volunteers participated, and cleaned 35.35 miles of beach, collecting 4,293 items. The Top Ten Items Collected included over 800 cigarette butts along with many plastic straws and stirrers.

Choctawatchee Bay Estuary Coalition Needs Your Help!

Do you have an impact on where you live and the environment around you?

The answer is yes! You can have an impact, and the Choctawhatchee Bay Estuary Program is asking for your help. How can you help? How does this program affect you? Let's look at the importance of the Choctawhatchee Bay Estuary Program, the impact of their Comprehensive Conservation Management Plan (CCMP), and how communities can come together to help the environment in which we all live.

When we think of Choctawhatchee Bay, we think about boating, kayaking, fishing, enjoying a day at Grady Brown Park, or having a meal with family and friends at The Bay or Nick's Seafood. More than that, it's also home to redfish, mullet, flounder, oysters, the endangered giant gulf sturgeon, and of course dolphins, which we all love to watch. The bay is an important part of our ecosystem and economy.

So, what is an estuary? "An estuary is where freshwater (rivers, streams, and the Bay) meet the ocean," explains Sabina Pennington, Public Outreach Specialist with the Choctawhatchee Bay Estuary Program. Beyond the Choctawhatchee Bay is the watershed that feeds the estuary, which is larger than most of us know. It's about 5400 square miles - north as far as Clayton, Alabama, and as far east as Chipley, Florida. "The Estuary Program helps connect people to our waterways so they can understand that water is our most important natural resource and the role water plays for our communities," said Sabina. "We show the wonders of estuaries and the necessary role they have [in] our environment. They aren't just natural marvels; they significantly benefit our communities and bolster our economy. We strive to ensure that everyone, particularly those in underserved communities, can enjoy the beauty of nature and benefit from a clean environment now and for future generations.'

If the Estuary Program helps us protect the watershed, the CCMP is like the standard operating procedure. "It serves as our guiding compass, directing our efforts towards addressing the most pressing priorities and issues in the Choctawhatchee Bay watershed. Think of the CCMP as a roadmap, charting a course to preserve the ecological health and balance of our

Insights for Investors: Trends

What drove inflation down over the past year?

Inflation, by many official accounts, peaked at over 9% about this time a year ago. Most recently, we have been informed that inflation, based upon CPI, is approaching 3% (currently around 3.2%). The question on many investors' minds is who, or what, has made it happen? According to the Associated Press, it is not one thing, but rather a combination of things.

First, the drop in energy = mainly oil and gas prices. After spiking over 60%, gas prices came down as did a barrel of oil. Next was aggressive action in raising rates on the part of

the Federal Reserve. One year ago, the Federal Funds rate was .25%. Today it is 5.33%. That is one of the fastest rises in U.S. history. When the Fed raises rates, savers and buyers of short-term investments see higher rates in money market funds, CDs and the like. That rate does have an intended effect on slowing borrowing and, thus, slowing the economy = adding to the decline of inflation. Lastly, there is the supply chain. The pandemic caused significant disruption in the development and distribution along the national and international supply chains. Many of those disruptions no longer exist and that, too, has helped bring prices down.

Home prices and mortgage rates are higher for sure. Many "would be" homeowners can no longer afford the note now that mortgage rates are near their highest levels in over 20 years (close to 7% after bottoming at less than 3% in 2020). Housing makes up a significant portion of CPI and, when that slows down, it brings inflation down.

What is The Phillips Curve? According to the Corporate Financial Institute, the Phillips Curve suggests that when inflation is down, unemployment is up. Put another way, it suggests that when inflation is up, unemployment is down. Something strange is happening right now: Inflation is down, and unemployment is down (or employment is up, remains high). Why might this be so? There are a couple of points of view we have heard lately. One is from Professor Jeremy Siegel of the Wharton School (University of Pennsylvania). He stated recently on CNBC and notes that productivity is getting stronger, and the economy is growing. Rick Rieder, who is the CIO of Global Fixed Income at Blackrock, said on Wall Street Week recently that with an economy that is 70% services and 70% consumption (consumers), the historical levers of higher rates have not hurt the economy as they have in the past. Also, when it comes to long-term borrowing, Reider points out that a lot of high-tech companies' self-fund versus borrow for their cap ex (capital expenditures budgets). He notes that for sure there have been some parts of the economy hurt (commercial real estate, regional and small banks, some parts of the manufacturing economy), but for the most part, there has not been widespread pain. Hence, we have the cost of living going down, employment remaining resilient and the economy growing.

Is this a trend or a short-term thing?

Is this just a short term thing or is this a trend? We think the answers are multifold: 1) Strides in technology with AI and other innovations continue to bolster growth. 2) Liquidity remains high – a.k.a. there is still a lot of money in the economy in checking and savings accounts. 3) The labor shortage keeps unemployment low. It also looks like - depending upon what you read and believe = that the labor shortage may be here to stay for a while. According to the U.S. Census Bureau, the population growth rate of the U.S. was 0.4% for the 12-month period ending in July 2022. This means that approximately 1.3 million people were added to the U.S. population during that period. Put another way, the U.S. population is growing at over 100k people per month. That

is a key driver of consumption. However, according to a report by the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis, there will be around 10,000 people turning 65 each day for the next two decades. This means that approximately 300,000 people are retiring each month in the U.S.

Is the labor shortage here to stay or here just for a while?

We went back in time, and reviewed an article written in 2005 in the ERE newsletter (a newsletter for human resource professionals) that predicted the labor shortages starting in 2010 and going well beyond 2020. They, of course, had no idea that a pandemic was coming. The net result is that baby boomers did retire as predicted, but at an accelerated rate in recent years. Add to that, many companies have demonstrated they encourage employees to retire early at 55. There is also a coming shortage across many employment sectors: Airline pilots and air traffic controllers, for example (we understand mandatory retirement is 65). Significant numbers are at or near these ages. The labor shortage is going to be with us for awhile. Will that prove inflationary? Believe it or not, it has not so far. Wage inflation is not having the impact that many predicted it would have.

What's an investor to do now?

So, where does that leave our investors? We think this is a time where short-term rates offer yield not seen in a long time (savings and money markets over 5%). We also look at equities across the board; not concentrated in any one area and representing opportunities for long-term buy-and-hold (and patient) investors. Fixed income rates (think bonds) have climbed again lately. The increase in longer-term rates is largely due to the U.S. Treasury issuing more bonds (the main lever) and longer dated bonds as well. That will drive yields up and prices down. We think investors could lock in good, long-term yields be they in treasuries, corporate or municipal bonds. We caution investors to always review the duration before investing in a particular bond. CDs certainly

offer significantly higher yields now, but we encourage investors to think about what those represent: Mainly higher yields over shorter terms.

We hear many investing pundits wondering where and when rates will peak. With Federal Funds at 5.33% now, we are aligned with opinions that see them coming down in 2024. We think that will be 3.5 - 4%. another potential reason to lock in a short-term CD or a longerterm fixed rate bond now. It may be a good idea to complement that with a diversified basket of stocks, as companies will continue to reap the productivity gains we are seeing now.

The Lost City on the "Forgotten Coast"

Port St. Joe is a riddle wrapped in a strange history. It's also one of the best-kept secrets in the state and one of the prettiest towns you'll ever visit. Founded in 1835 as a deepwater port and linked to inland destinations by rail, St. Joseph, aka Port St. Joe, became an important commercial hub in the early 1800s, for a time the largest city in the state of Florida. In 1838, delegates arrived to draw up the first State Constitution in the years leading up to Florida's admission as a state in 1845. But the town's boom ended swiftly: yellow fever

swept through the town in 1841, and a hurricane storm surge a few years later wiped out what remained. The once prosperous town of 12,000 was reduced to only 500 residents. By the mid-1800s, Port St. Joe was a virtual ghost town. It wasn't until 1909 when a new rail track was laid and a new town founded that life began to return to the region.

When walking down Port St. Joe's main street these days, one wouldn't be surprised to run into Barney or Aunt Bee shopping in a local market. Though there's plenty of charm in town, the Cape San Blas area boasts one







of the most beautiful stretches of beaches in America and shouldn't be missed. The "Forgotten Coast" is a name the local chamber of commerce came up with after the paper mill closed to generate some much-needed hype. Many of the permanent residents wish the forgotten coast would remain just that: "forgotten." But after several visits, I've concluded that "Unforgettable Coast" might hit closer to the mark.

Finding Magic on the "Forgotten Coast"

In the past, you'd wake up in Mexico Beach and swear it was 1955. The town that time forgot got remembered at 1 p.m., October 10, 2018, as Hurricane Michael came ashore, a category five storm packing winds of 160 mph. Its old-world charm is being replaced with brick-and-mortar buildings built to withstand 175 mph winds and rain. You Didn't Earn My Respect

I was talking to a student about a difficult relationship with a teacher. The student didn't like the teacher's communication style and decided the teacher had not earned respect. The student gave less effort and had a negative attitude, because

the teacher was "not worthy of respect." The student ended up with a poor grade, being grounded and not being a great version of self all in the name of withdrawing respect from someone who hadn't earned it. Following the interaction, I started wondering about the cost to ourselves and others when we practice withdrawing respect from others when they displease us or behave in ways that don't align with our values.

It's uncomfortable when we discover someone holds a different view or value that is in fundamental opposition to our way of approaching life. We are left to decide how we will engage this person going forward. Current culture encourages us to believe respect is earned and only safely given to people who agree with us. Social media and news give us permission to cut off, cut out, publicly shame and withdraw not only respect, but also kindness from anyone who sees things differently. This begins as a way to "hold people accountable" and ends with us finding ourselves being unkind, rude, judgmental, self-righteous, bitter and a version of self that can become unrecognizable.

What if there are two kinds of respect? The traditional definition of respect is holding someone in high esteem or admiration. This type of admiring respect is what we refer to when talking about earning respect. It is based on character, performance and behavioral choices. We choose to bestow admiring respect on some and not on others. The second brand of respect is basic human respect. Basic human respect is the fundamental belief that each human has inherent value and worth regardless of what they believe or how they behave. Basic human respect is born out of respecting self and extending to others the same level of common decency you hope others will extend to you. This respect assumes we do not have the right to subtract from the value of another person regardless of their disagreement with us in word or action.

Basic human respect is freely assumed and not earned or lost.

Our culture is often confusing withdrawal of admiring respect with withdrawal of basic human respect. When we don't admire someone, there is not a significant social cost. When we don't extend basic human respect, we begin to believe we are better, to verbally assault others, to lose compassion, to dehumanize, to oppress, to reduce our character and to blindly engage in hypocrisy-all in the name of withholding respect others aren't doing their job to earn. When we make withholding basic human respect a habit, we find ourselves going down a dark character hole. So, how can we avoid this pitfall?

5 Ways to Practice Extending Basic Human Respect to Others

Extend grace freely because you're going to need it. No matter how hard you try, you will not be perfect and will make mistakes. Your values will not always align with others. You will need others to extend basic human respect to you.

Use judgment as a mirror. Typically, when we feel judgmental of others, there is an internal issue we need to address. Ask yourself what purpose your judgment is serving both inwardly and outwardly.

Try trading judgment for curiosity. Try being curious about others beliefs/behaviors.

Treat others with kindness you would show to your friend or child. You would be kind to your friend or child if they disagreed with you. Treat others in the world with this same level of kindness. Your kindness should be based on who you want to be, not on whether someone else is pleasing you.

Speak to others as equals. You are not better or worse than anyone. Use a tone of voice, words, eye contact and nonverbals that reflect your belief that others are your equal.

Embrace humility. Just because you believe you are right about things doesn't mean you are. Try remembering you are human and you have things to learn from other people. Sometimes we learn the most profound lessons from those who see things differently.

Navigating the Complexities of Healthcare in Walton County

Driving along Hwy 98 there is one thing I am consistently noticing: new construction. It seems every mile along 98 and 30A there are new buildings popping up. It's not just commercial buildings. We are seeing it all from new subdivisions to apartment complexes to large shopping centers. The thing we are not seeing enough of at the moment are new doctors' offices.

One of the primary challenges that our growing population faces is the strain on healthcare facilities and resources. Hospitals, clinics, and medical practices that were designed to serve a smaller number of people now find themselves grappling with an increased demand for services. Longer wait times, difficulty in securing appointments, and overcrowded emergency rooms have become commonplace. This not only affects the quality of care but also the overall patient experience.

However, it's not all doom and gloom. We still live in an incredible area and more and more infrastructure is coming to accommodate these needs, eventually. What is important now is to understand what all of your healthcare options are and who you can contact to navigate those complexities.

If you are new to Walton County, welcome! There is so much to love here. Obviously, we have stunning beaches and a relaxed lifestyle, but our vibrant community is also home to some of the friendliest people you will meet. That being said, you are likely going to need a new healthcare plan. If you currently are enrolled in a group plan you have 63 days to update your coverage. If you are currently enrolled in Medicare, you have 60 days to update your plan after the month you report your move. Now the hard part is finding a great doctor who is accepting new patients. This is just one of the ways an independent broker can help.

As of this writing, we still don't have access to the 2024 individual plans. I expect to be able to see those in October just before the November 1st open enrollment period.

If you are aging into Medicare in the next few months, you don't want to wait until the last minute. As a reminder, for those of you turning 65 or retiring and coming off your employer plan, if you are not collecting social security, you need to request your Medicare card with both parts A & B. You must be enrolled in both in order to add a Medicare Supplement plan or a Medicare Advantage plan. You can initiate your enrollment up to three months before you want your plan to go into effect. For example, if you are turning 65 in January, you should request your Medicare card in October. After you apply, which can be done at a Social Security office or online at www.ssa.gov/ medicare, it will take at least 30 days to process your application. You can't apply for an Advantage Plan without your Medicare number showing both Parts A & B effective dates, which are typically the first day of your birth month.

If you stayed on an employer plan after age 65, my recommendation is to request your Medicare card three months before you want your Medicare plan to go into effect.

For those of you on Medicare Advantage plans and Prescription Drug Plans if you want to make any changes, don't forget the AEP (Annual Election Period) is October 15th to December 7th. If you need help with any of this, please call us!

I remember coming across a statement by a preacher who lived in the last century. He was expressing his position on prayer for healing. quite discouraging and stressful, but not for Bill. "I have faith in God. Maybe I'll get a kidney, and maybe I won't. It's okay whatever God decides."

You may wonder how Bill maintains his faith. He says



that with God's love comes faith and there's nothing that can remove that. "God has me in His hands. I talk to Him all day, and the beauty is that I've learned to listen. There's really nothing to it – just listen." As Bill says, you have a choice to make every morning. When you spend your time thinking about and trusting your Heavenly Father, there is no room for worry. Because of his

health issues, Bill has plenty of opportunities to share his faith. He gets to tell others about the Gospel all the time. "Indirectly, it's a blessing having the health problems."

He recalls one time when he was watching a video while sitting in dialysis, and he was getting emotional. The tech guy asked him if he was alright,

which gave Bill the perfect opening to share his faith. "When they start asking me questions, God speaks through me."

Out of His steadfast love and compassion for His children, God heals. He relieves pain and fixes what is broken. He dries tears and calms fears. And out of that same steadfast love and compassion for His children, God chooses not to heal. At least in this life. Our purpose in remaining here on earth is to be salt and light. As Jesus said – the fields are ripe for harvest. Pray that God will send out workers into His harvest field.

And we also know that God delights in using the weak things of the world to accomplish His purposes and plans. He always sees us. He always understands what we're going through. And our ultimate healing will be when we finally get to see Him face-to-face.

So, whether God's purpose for your life is to heal you or to shower you with grace during your trial, continue to keep your eyes on Jesus. "I work as hard as I can, then God will take it the rest of the way. God has done unbelievable things."

palpitating moments:Class presentations.

- Distribution of test scores or worse, report cards.
- Being at the free throw line for two shots, your team trailing by one and one second left on the clock.

Later in life, the instances of nervousness can morph into:

- Will she marry me?Will I be selected for the promotion?
- Do we relocate for a job opportunity?
- What do the results of the blood test indicate?

Beyond these instances of momentary nerves that just about all of us face and have faced are the more paralyzing episodes of anxiety and panic. I must admit that through my own life, I have faced those debilitating struggles.

- Avoiding certain social situations.
- Unprovoked instances of rapid heart rate and hyperventilation, caused by overactive adrenaline.
- A sense of impending doom, feelings of being out of control.
- Fear of being fearful.
- At times visualizing a destitute, bleak future.

Desperate for solutions, I was fortunate to locate the services of skilled counselors who walked

- alongside and steadied me during the darkest days. These days, on the occasions when I sense the onset of challenging periods of mental warfare, some of the tools that are helpful include:
- Engagement. Activity for me is vital to mental health. Rest is critical, but idleness can be an enemy.
- Exercise. Some of my best moments and creative thoughts come during aerobic or strength training or cycling.
- Writing. Journaling, putting thoughts on paper, even writing this very piece is cathartic.
- Connection. Who might need to be encouraged through text, phone call, or breaking bread?
- Laughter. What lightens the mood or generates humor, who has a unique presence? At a recent wedding, the bride appeared to struggle with panic in the middle of the ceremony. Rather than be overwhelmed, she approached it with a sense of humor and made it through. I admired that.

Very importantly believing that my own struggles can and will be a critical resource for another soul at some opportune time in the future.

Anxieties for many can be overwhelming and for some debilitating. Should you often find yourself overcome with a kind of fear that goes beyond the temporary condition of the moment, causes you to alter or avoid usual activities, or brings about withdrawal, I urge and encourage you to seek the assistance of a qualified behavioral counselor or therapist. You are precious; when you make it to the brighter side, which you will, someone else will need you to be there for them. Plan now to do that.

The cow was a Champion, raised in the Gifu prefecture in Japan. Its trophy still adorns a wall behind the sushi bar. This year, the Fish House was selected to be one of approximately 50 restaurants in the US to be certified to serve Kobe beef from Japan. There are only six other restaurants in Florida certified to sell Kobe in Florida. In addition to Hida and Kobe beef, the Fish House offers Snow Beef from Chateau Uenae, Miyazaki Beef, as well as Olive fed and Drunken Wagyu.

The Million Dollar Quartet

Picture it; America-1956. A gallon of gas is 29 cents and a glass bottle of Coca Cola costs you a nickel. Grace Kelly becomes Princess Grace of Monaco and new products on the market include Play Doh, Comet Cleanser and a funny little dice game called Yahtzee. It is also the year a relatively unknown Elvis Presley explodes onto the scene at the tender age of 21. The term "catapults" might even be more apt. 1956 is a rock-n-roll pot of water that is just beginning to boil, and then Elvis comes along and cranks up the heat.

He released five songs to top the Billboard pop charts that year including "Heartbreak Hotel," "I Want You, I Need You, I Love You," "Don't Be Cruel," "Hound Dog" and "Love Me Tender."

On Nov. 15, 1956, the movie "Love Me Tender" was released, and not long after that on Dec. 4, 1956, Elvis stopped by Memphis-based Sun Records Studios to have a chat with owner Sam

Phillips, also known as the man who invented rock-n-roll. It just so happened that Rockabilly artist Carl Perkins, who originally wrote and performed "Blue Suede Shoes," was there to lay down some tracks. Wild piano man Jerry Lee Lewis was brought in to help fill out those tracks with his distinctive sound. Oh, and there was someone else there, too—a popular country singer named Johnny Cash.

These four legendary musicians proceeded to have an impromptu jam session that included gospel, hymns, rockabilly,

country and a little rock-n-roll thrown in for good measure. Sam Phillips had the presence of mind to leave the tapes running, and managed to get a recording of this epic jam session that made the Memphis newspapers the next day with the headline

Five Things To Do Before a Storm

It's the middle of summer, and you just heard on the radio that a Category 4 storm is about to hit in your area. What should you do to prepare? Stocking up on non-perishable food and bottled water is a given and also batteries. Those are both good preventative measures. But, what will you do if the storm hits your house? How can you minimize damage to your home and to your other possessions?

The first thing you should do is call your insurance agent and ask for a copy of both your declarations page and your policy jacket. You should do this both for your home and for your vehicles. If you have boats, motorcycles, an RV or any other contrivance or dwellings, get all of your policy documents together in one place. Familiarize yourself with your deductibles, coverages and any exclusions or limitations. You should do this

The second thing you should do is take pictures and videos of the inside and outside of your home and email them to yourself. This is to show what your house looked like BEFORE anything happened. If you recently purchased big ticket items like new furniture or an entertainment center, email yourself any receipts you might have for the more expensive items in your home. In the event of a loss, receipts, photos and videos will aid the adjusters in processing your claim in a fair and timely man-

The last thing to do is make sure you have a battery-operated

charger for your phone, so that in the event you do get hit, you can communicate with your family, and call the agent and insurance company for help in putting in your claim. Get gas before the storm. Don't just top it off. If you have three vehicles, take them to the station one by one and fill them all up. The first thing that happens after a hurricane is a localized shortage of goods, and you don't want to have to scramble around at the last minute and go without. If you prepare yourself, your home and your vehicles well in advance of the upcoming storm, you can breathe a sigh of relief that even if the storm hits, you have done everything you can to prevent against further loss.
