

Co-founder and Executive Director Dr. Hillary Glenn, DNP shares, "This building is by the community, for the community. We wouldn't be here without the many contributions of our generous supporters, and we're incredibly excited to expand our services and hours to serve our neighbors even more. Designed with the patient in mind, the building's intentional details are all planned to ensure privacy and provide a calming comfortable environment, as well as being organized so the volunteers and team are able



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to easily access the tools they need." Dr. Glenn continues, "Unique attributes of the facility include a children's educational play area, a state-of-the-art classroom with a teaching kitchen, and a meditation prayer garden. To support the calming environment, we leaned into the natural landscape. This is seen with the oversized windows in the lobby looking out over the beautiful native forest, the dental operatories line up with large windows so patients will be looking out at trees while being treated and our partnership with the CAA and their Arts in Public Spaces program will enhance the interior beauty by bringing in works from local artists of our local environment inside."

The new clinic will provide more space for volunteers who serve the clinic in various administrative, clinical and hospitality roles. It will also include six exam rooms including a pediatric exam room, an increase from two in the current pop-up clinic. This means the team will be able to serve 850+ patients a month in the future, an increase of 300%. The clinic will expand its preventive and primary care services with the addition of dentistry, mental health services and expanded onsite lab testing. Wellness, nutrition and educational classes will now be possible because of the new teaching kitchen and meeting space. This will enable the PWMC to further its mission of building a stronger and healthier community by providing high-quality primary health care regardless of the patient's means or access.

The PWMC staff, Board of Directors and volunteer team are all excited for what the new facility means for the growing roster of patients as well as the greater Northwest Florida region. For the past six years, operating only two days a week, they have provided over \$3.5 million in healthcare services on site and have had over 15,000 patient visits.

Once the volunteer-driven clinic is able to expand their service hours, they expect to be able to see close to 10,000 patients annually providing over 1 million dollars in healthcare services per year.

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Community Sustaining an Ecosystem Through Stewardship

The ecosystem provided by the Choctawhatchee Bay and surrounding areas is vital for environmental balance and biodiversity, with its waterways and estuaries serving as crucial components. These aquatic habitats not only support diverse life forms but also play a key role in regulating temperature, nutrient cycles, and serve as breeding grounds. Additionally, these waterways are integral to the local economy, contributing to fishing, recreation, and tourism. Preserving their health is essential for clean water sources, flood mitigation, and regional resilience. Sustainable practices and conservation efforts are crucial for ensuring the ongoing well-being of this important ecosystem.

The Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance (CBA) is a nonprofit organization formed in 1996 dedicated to promoting swimmable, fishable waterways in Northwest Florida through monitoring, education, restoration and research. In order to inspire water stewardship, they are working to grow a network of supporters to protect these precious natural resources. Here are some of the recent ways they've been able to drive that mission forward.



Northwest Florida State College

Through their education efforts, the CBA was recently able to bring hands-on science learning to over 3,600 students in our community through their Grasses in Classes program. Students grow shoreline grasses at their school, tend to salt marsh nurseries throughout the year, and receive monthly education on local estuarine topics. At the end of the school year, students will then plant their shoreline grasses at a designated salt marsh restoration site along Choctawhatchee Bay. This helps support the CBA's living shoreline initiative.

In October, CBA's Executive Director Alison McDowell & Senior Restoration Program Manager Rachel Gwin, attended the 2023 Living Shorelines Tech Transfer Workshop, an event hosted by Restore America's Estuaries and Galveston Bay Foundation. Alison presented on how CBA sources plants for restoration, and they were able to see Galveston Bay Foundation sites to learn about oyster recycling, conservation lands and education programs.

The CBA relies on sponsors to enable their initiatives. One admirable supporter is Islander Coastal Outfitter, situated at the Boardwalk on Okaloosa Island. As a proud member of 1% For the Planet, they dedicate 1% of their annual sales to the CBA. Beyond financial support, they actively volunteer and have made a substantial impact by assisting with Grasses in Classes this year.

Another outstanding supporter is the beach and fishing apparel company, FL BABE. They endorse four nonprofits, including the CBA. In addition to shopping on their website, you can also explore information about conservation efforts across Florida on their blog. They've even featured our CBA in a November article.

If you're interested in supporting the CBA by volunteering, there are openings currently available with the Water Quality Monitoring and Monofilament Recycling initiatives. The CBA collaborates with the UF Florida LAKEWATCH program to conduct monthly water quality tests at 130 stations spanning Choctawhatchee Bay, the Choctawhatchee River, and the coastal dune lakes of Walton County. The CBA is actively seeking dedicated citizen scientists to contribute their valuable efforts and help ensure the program's effectiveness.

The Monofilament Recycling bins are located at various locations along Destin Harbor, Bluewater Bay Marina Complex, Veterans Park and Ross Mar-







ler Park on Okaloosa Island, as well as Nick's Seafood Restaurant, Cessna Park and Thomas Pilcher Park. These bins play a crucial role in preventing fishing line from finding its way into the water where it poses a threat to wildlife causing entanglement, starvation, loss of flipper, tail, or wings, and can even cause death. Volunteers are needed to maintain the bins, aid in outreach efforts and occasionally help with beach cleanups.

For additional details on ongoing and upcoming initiatives and projects undertaken by the CBA, as well as opportunities for volunteering, please explore basinalliance.org. Remember that we coexist with a diverse range of wildlife that depends on the same water sources. Our actions can make a positive impact on their habitats. By being more mindful, we can contribute to the well-being of the creatures that share our environment.





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
She's been Missing for 6 months

Insights for Investors: Deciding on Where and How to Invest in the New Year

If we reflect on almost four decades in the investment world, we cannot find, with any consistency, anyone who can tell you when and how to invest in the next year. For sure, there are market predictions, economic predictions and forecasts and opinions. The question we keep coming back to is: Does anyone really KNOW where the markets, the economy and the world are headed? Sometimes a prognosticator will get it right, but he or she is rarely right on a consistent basis. Why might that be?

Morgan Housel is an author who has written two books on investing and behavior. One is title "Same as Ever" and the other is "The Psychology of Money." The main theme drawn from these two writings is that the future cannot be predicted, because people and events cannot be predicted. Would anyone have known for sure that Russia would have invaded Ukraine two years ago (and the economic fallout that followed)? Or, as was pointed out, the effects or significance of the coronavirus pandemic? Housel points out that The Economist magazine, well revered in the investing and professional world, predicted neither in its annual forecasts for 2020 and 2022 respectively.

Some call unusual or unpredictable events "Black Swan" events. No one knows when they will appear. It's impossible to predict things, so we encourage investors to plan and invest according to their time frame, their risk tolerance and their investment objective. These are the big three for most investors.

Charlie Munger, Warren Buffet's partner, has had many books written about him, as has Buffet. A current read is "The Tao of Charlie Munger" by David Clark. It is replete with lessons from the investing great who passed away in December of 2023. One consistent lesson was for investors to not be in a hurry. We suggest that investors identify companies, or funds, or bonds or instruments that fit your investment objective, their time frame and their comfort level, and then be patient.

2023 tested the patience of many investors as they saw the markets gain substantially for most of the year while perhaps their investments did not. Had they held the so called magnificent seven (META, Google, Apple, Microsoft, Tesla, Nvidia and Amazon) only, they would have seen those returns. Most stocks (the remainder of approximately 500 stocks in the S&P 500) had lesser returns, no returns or perhaps lost up until about October of 2023. Then, in November, interest rates (based upon the 10-year U.S. Treasury note) began to decline (from approximately a high of 5% to 3.9%). The market's performance for the S&P in November was almost nine percent and many long-term bonds appreciated as much as 6%. December numbers, while not final at this writing were equally compelling. So, what might be learned, or gained, from all of this?

Peter Lynch, the well know fund manager from Fidelity, said many years ago in one of his three books to not give up hope at the worst possible time and sellout. We have seen this repeated by many investment managers for years, to not sell at the bottom (as if you would know the bottom). Did that happen in 2023? Many investors were convinced that cash or CDs was the best place to be and as a result either sold out and moved to cash or CDs or remained in cash or CDs. To be clear, these low to no risk investments play a part in most investors' portfolios. However, we



would suggest that if someone has a long term time frame, to not use a short term lens, so to speak, when making an allocation decision or a change.

The U.S. economy continues to lead the world in innovation, cost of doing business and opportunity. We look back over the last almost 100 years and see that investors saw the highest returns in large cap stocks followed by bonds then by cash (Ibbotson Charts). Research, know what you own or what you want to own and why you own it. Know how long you want to own something. Appropriate risk mitigation along with patience might serve investors well in 2024 and beyond.



What Could Go Wrong?

In 2012, The Mischief Theatre Company dreamed up a worst-case scenario play where absolutely everything that can go wrong, does go wrong. It is the stuff that us theatre-makers have nightmares about, like set malfunctions, missed cues, and actors getting bonked on the head. It first premiered at the Old Red Lion Theatre in London and due to its success eventually moved on to the West End. Coincidentally, film and TV director J.J. Abrams had been filming Star Wars: The Force Awakens in London in 2014 when, on a day off, he popped into a West End theater to see The Play That Goes Wrong and absolutely loved it.

"I just became obsessed with this idea of trying to help in any way that I could if it were ever to move to Broadway," Abrams said, adding that he soon teamed up with veteran theater producer Kevin McCollum (Rent, Avenue Q) to do just that.1

In 2017, The Play That Goes Wrong premiered on Broadway with Abrams making his theatrical debut as director.

From London, to New York, and now Emerald Coast Theatre Company in Miramar Beach, FL, this show is like the "Little Engine That Could." 7 Ways to Focus on Internal **Character Growth**

1. Identify your character growth area. Ask yourself: What do I really want to be true in my life and relationships? Then, notice a character trait you need to shift for your desired reality to become true. An example for a parent: When my kids are adults, I want to have a supportive, patient, curious relationship with them that motivates them to want to spend time with me. Character traits to consider addressing to help this desire become a reality: Are you currently patient? Are you currently asking curious questions and listening? Are you currently communicating support? Choose the area where you need the most growth.

2. Notice patterns and situations related to your growth area. If your growth area is patience, notice when you tend to rush others. Notice when you are short with others. Notice the frequency of the character struggle and the situations in which it occurs.

3. Identify and increase understanding regarding the origin of the character pattern and how it is impacting your current life. Did your family of origin value being kind? When did being kind feel like a problem for you when you were younger? Counseling may be a helpful

tool if you struggle to understand the origins of your character pattern.

4. Determine what you need to know inside to be able to let go of the current character pattern in favor of the character you are trying to grow. To embrace more determination, you may need to know that you can do hard things. To embrace more curiosity, you may need to know you don't have to know everything.

5. Try a new way. Notice when you want to judge others rather than extending kindness. Stop. Breathe. Remember what you are growing toward. Try suspending judgment, then

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
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Where Does Our Peace Come From?

Or in Ukraine, where soldiers rot intrenched in freezing fox holes. They fight a war nobody wants, but a lone madman in Moscow. Where does peace come from?

Yes, chaos reigns in the world.

Twenty-two veterans a day commit suicide. Three of the leading causes of death among teenagers are accidents, homicide and suicide. The United States records close to 700,000 divorces per year. Bad news abounds, but good news is on the way.

Christians have downloaded the free Bible App, YouVersion, over a billion times as they seek to learn more from the Word of God. What are these billion people looking for? In three of the last four years, the most common search on this app is not for scriptures relating to success, prosperity or healing. The most common search is "Fear not, for I am with thee."

People are searching for peace, the antidote to fear. They are fearful about their future, finances and families. But we do not find peace in financial security, nor is it found in political consensus. We find peace in a person, and his name is Jesus, the Prince of Peace.

Jesus said in John 14:27 (NIV), "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid." Peace is a gift Christ wants to give. He wants to give it to us far more than we will ask for it. You have not because you

The Lord's presence conveys peace to us. According to Isiah 43:5 (NIV) God says, "Fear not, for I am with you." Fear has no foundation. We have no reason to

left a church in San Antonio, unable to control my feelings, the Lord whispered into my heart, "You are angry with Me. You thought your life, family and future

were shattered. As I

were secure, but you trusted the wrong things. Will you trust Me now?"

I turned away from my anger and self-justification. God's presence in my heart was restored. My peace came from the Lord.

God's presence guarantees His peace. The remedy to fear and insecurity rests in faith in God's faithfulness. Healing for broken emotions flows in God's presence. Will you invite God into your life in 2024? Turning to the Lord is our barrier to depression, worry and anxiety. Allow peace to flow into your heart.

2. Safely use space heaters rather than heating your entire home

The cost to run a central heating system with only electric heat (not a heat pump) can add up to \$1.50 or more per hour to heat your home. Rather than heating the entire house, use an electric blanket or a single space heater. Keep in mind the average space heater costs about 25 cents per hour to heat the space, so turn it off and unplug when not in the room.

Stepping Into the Shark Tank


Aside from swimming in the shark tank, might these be a pretty good list of questions to begin with right now, in preparation for 2024 and the usual resolutions that will come about then?



Resolutions

Welcome a new year! A recent survey of 531 U.S. adults showed the top resolutions are exercise more, eat healthier, and save money. A look back 20 years, CNN's poll showed the top resolutions were: get out of debt, lose weight and develop a healthy habit (quit smoking). It's not surprising that the top resolutions are similar year after year, because they all have great

intentions and actually go hand and hand. Let's look at eating healthier and exercising. Eating healthy can mean cooking more at home, which saves money. Eating healthy also could cause fewer medications or doctor visits, which saves money. The same with exercising, developing a good exercise plan will make you healthier and could cause fewer medications or doctor visits, thereby saving you money. My grandmother once said, it's better to spend money at the grocery store on healthy foods than for doctor's visits.

Another way to save money which is always on the top of my mind, and typically not on most, is to increase efficiency and tighten the envelope of our homes. Tightening the envelope is not a phrase from Tom Wolfe's novel "The Right Stuff," but a term used to describe a system.



The Building envelope is the physical barrier between the exterior and interior environments enclosing a structure (your home). Generally, the building envelope consists of a series of components and systems such as a roof, walls, windows and a foundation. These systems protect the interior from the effects of the environment like precipitation, wind, temperature, humidity and ultraviolet radiation. One function of the building envelope is to control these effects between the interior and exterior of the building. When there is missing or compacted insulation or unsealed windows, doors and attic penetrations, your building envelope is compromised and wasting energy

If your home is older than 15 years, you most likely don't have enough insulation to meet today's guidelines. Prior insulation code for this area was R-19 (roughly 6.5" of insulation), now the new code is R-30 (roughly 10.5" of insulation). That's a 61% increase. Why the increase? Because we know that R-19 insulation has trouble keeping our homes comfortable and the only solution was to add more insulation. We recommend R-38 (14.5" of insulation). More states are requiring the use of reflective radiant bar-

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
and comfort.

rier insulation installed on the inside of the attic roof line. Reflective radiant barriers reflect 97% of radiant heat in your attic, lowering the attic temperature by 40 to 50 degrees in the summer, allowing your insulation and ductwork to perform better, saving you money and increasing your comfort. It's all about tightening the envelope to increase efficiency and comfort. If one of your resolutions is to save money this year, schedule an inspection to know exactly where your home could improve its envelope.



Watersound Club staff are working closely with Love Golf Design founders Davis Love III, Mark Love and Scot Sherman to bring the new course to life as an additional amenity for Watersound Club members. In homage to both the PGA great helping design the new golf course and the fact that it will be the third championship golf course in the Watersound Club collection, the new course will be named simply "The Third."

The Third is designed to comfortably span approximately 300 acres just north of another Watersound Club golf course, Shark's Tooth. The generous acreage allows the design team room to be imaginative in creating a layout that will please



and challenge golfers of all skill levels.

Love Golf Design and Watersound Club teams selected a unique 18-hole, Par 72 design with six sets of tees, allowing golfers to adjust the course distance to play from 4,900 yards to over 7,600 yards on a firm, fast-playing course. The flexibility of play will offer accessibility for the casual golfer, and even the longest tour players will enjoy a challenge while hitting from the back tees.

The Third joins an impressive lineup of exclusive Watersound Club amenities including Shark's Tooth and Camp Creek golf courses; the member favorite Watersound Beach Club amenities comprising two resort-style pools, two

dining venues, and over a mile Mexico; and the newly opened of beachfront along the Gulf of Camp Creek amenities featur-



ing a state-of-the-art wellness center, tennis and pickleball courts, a sprawling pool complex, three dining venues, and more.

The Third is the latest of several Watersound Club amenity expansion projects launched in response to membership growth as well as strong demand for golf among members. Watersound Club membership has added more than 500 new members in 2023 and now welcomes approximately 3,100 members from 40 states.

Leading the Love Golf Design team is Davis Love III. He is perhaps best known as a World Golf Hall of Fame inductee who was twice picked to lead America's Ryder Cup Team. Just as impressive, though, are the 27 completed projects in Love Golf Design's portfolio, including both new designs and renovations. Working to naturally incorporate the mix of upland vegetation and undisturbed wetland areas into the course layout offers an opportunity to top even those previous designs.

"After exploring the property on our first few visits, we found so many options it was hard to narrow the new course down to just 18 holes," said Davis Love III. "Lead architect Scot Sherman, Mark Love and I believe the variety of the site lends itself to building a course with a timeless character. We're pleased to work with a routing that flows across white sandy dunes, with diverse native plant materials, along with beautiful pockets of old-growth cypress and pine trees to frame the golf holes. We are thrilled with how the routing of the golf course is progressing at this point."

Construction has already begun on The Third. The company anticipates the course will open for play in 2025. Additionally, St. Joe is in the planning stage of residential homesites near this new golf course.
