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
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Joyful Dedication to Education in Kilimanjaro

A life-changing tip following their Kilimanjaro summit not only impacted the guide who received the tip but also Jim and Kristi Sumpter, local Walton County residents and co-founders of Endeavor Expeditions. After learning that their tip would help put their guide's child through school for the year, they began taking steps to develop Kids of Kilimanjaro, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit to help fund educational opportunities for the children of Kilimanjaro guides and porters.

Jim and Kristi have built partnerships with local guides across the globe, but it's been their years of traveling in Tanzania and the gratitude, generosity and genuine joy of the guides and porters of Kilimanjaro that inspired them to start their nonprofit organization. Both Jim and Kristi have summited Kilimanjaro multiple times with Jim leading teams to the summit. This winter, they invited local award-winning



photographer Chandler Williams of Modus Photography to join them on their Kilimanjaro and Safari expedition to not only create marketing content for Kids of Kilimanjaro but to experience for himself the joyful spirit of the guides, porters and their families. You may be familiar with Chandler's photography, a mix of inspiring landscapes, people, and wildlife from 30A and around the world. Chandler has experience with international travel and is "comfortable in a lot of uncomfortable environments" with his cam-

era. He arrived in Arusha several days before the expedition to spend time with the families of the African team. There can be anywhere from four to ten porters for every one person making the climb. Chandler's expedition with Jim and Kristi had a total of 10 climbers, some local and some out of state. They had 40 members on their African team to assist them. Porters are expected to carry tents, propane tanks, cooking supplies, toilets and equipment with packs weighing up to 40 pounds each, up the mountain through five different ecological climate zones. Most of them have worn-out tennis shoes, and often lack rain gear, hats, gloves or proper clothing for climbing. They rely a lot on donations and tips. Some people donate their supplies and outdoor apparel at the end of an expedition.

"These guys that are carrying your gear, they're nothing

A Beach Within Reach: Access May Look Different, But Still Accessible

Walton County is widely regarded and celebrated for its 26 miles of sugarwhite sand paired with incredible turquoise waters. It's truly a breathtaking sight and the reason that many of our residents were attracted here.

Our beaches are what draws visitors here as well, generating an economic impact of more than \$6 billion annually and supporting more than 40,000 jobs for our residents. Tourism is the No. 1 economic driver in Walton County.

Historically, Walton County has had a mix of public and private beaches. What does that look like today? In many ways, it looks the same. There are still portions of beach that remain private (think of our resort areas like Alys Beach, Rosemary Beach or Seaside) and there are condos, singlefamily homes and other developments that have deeded access to portions of beachfront.

With spring break upon us and the summer beach season rapidly approaching, it's important to acknowledge there have been some changes along the beach.

but cheerful, singing, happy, and helpful. It's unbelievable," stated Chandler.

When Chandler found himself with his waterproof boots drenched from rain, the guide grabbed his boots and gave them to the cooks to dry over the propane tank when they were done cooking. "There's probably 10 people in a three-man tent. They're huddled and trying to dry them off for me, like just laughing and cheering. I almost broke down. It's just their willingness to help," Chandler said.

The guides make around \$25/day, while cooks make \$15/ day and porters make between \$5-\$10/day. What Chandler observed is what Jim and Kristi also experienced. People who, although they are doing extremely physically demanding work in less



than ideal conditions, are doing it with a heart of humility and joy, singing and laughing throughout their journey. "They're doing this hard work and they're not making a lot of money. They're making the sacrifices for their children, but they're doing it happily you know."

In Tanzania, school is considered a privilege. Even though it's officially "free," education can cost around \$800 per year due to fees, uniform costs, books, food, and supplies. Transportation can also be costly due to long distances between schools in rural areas. With all these obstacles, getting a good education can be difficult, but finishing school means more opportunities and a



brighter future.

Kids of Kilimanjaro was created to help with tuition assistance to students of families of the Kilimanjaro communities. Opportunities for education lead to opportunities for better jobs, which in turn benefit families and communities. "Education is important," stated Chandler. "It can change everything for these families." He and his wife will be

funding one porter's son's education indefinitely.

"It's really hard to convey how genuine the experience was," said Chandler. "It's a life changing experience when you go on these trips with them. This is something, personally, I plan on being a part of the rest of my life. My wife and I now pay for one of the students, a porter's son. Modus Photography is going to pay for his education indefinitely."

The most important change from a private beach standpoint is the ability for the public to now have access to beachfront that was inaccessible in many areas. Based on the county's settlement agreement, the public now has access to the area 20 feet landward of the wet-dry shoreline - known as the transitory zone for walking, running, jogging and entry into the water for swimming and other activities. This only applies to beachfront parcels that were part of the county's customary use settlement agreement and summary judgment. With this expansion, beachgoers are welcome to enjoy the transitory zone between 9 a.m.- 4 p.m. There are other restrictions that apply to these parcels, which can be found on the Visit South Walton website: https://www. visitsouthwalton.com/.

What remains unchanged is the ability for residents and visitors to enjoy county-owned beaches along the Gulf of Mexico, in addition to our state parks. The county's Regional Beach Accesses and Neighborhood

Beach Accesses provide opportunities for everyone to soak up some sunshine, while the state parks are perfect getaways and provide their own special experience.

Approximately two-thirds of Walton County's

able for the public to enjoy. Ad-PRIDE ditionally, from the Bay County l i n e ALLON COUNTY, FLOY to the Okaloosa County line. both residents and visitors still have the ability to traverse

the beach along the wet sand area for the entirety of Walton County's 26 miles of shoreline.

Walton County is also committed to securing additional beachfront. Since 2016, the Tourism Department has purchased more than \$76 million worth of property for beach access and parking expansion.

These purchases were made with TDT (Tourist Development Tax) funds or bed taxes as they are commonly referred to and

not taxpayer dollars - so visitors to Walton County are funding these acquisitions. Please know that expanding available beachfront has been and will continue to be a priority.

The "Bear" Necessities of Conservation

Walton County has a few local celebrities that are familiar with the spotlight, but our woodland neighbors, the Florida Black Bear, are getting their time to shine. The Paper Bear, a nonprofit, is creating a soon-to-be-released feature film to bring awareness of the importance of biodiversity through the lives of the Florida Black Bears and a better understanding of how we can live in harmony with our environment. The film itself is a conservation movement.

"It's a love letter to the state of Florida, and specifically the panhandle of Florida," stated Co-Producer Arix Zalace on The Paper Bear Instagram. "It's one of the most important regions in North America." Besides the obvious, what makes the panhandle and Florida Black Bears so special that there's an entire film being made? Let's set the scene.

We know by the millions of people that flock to our sugar sand beaches and turquoise waters, that The Emerald Coast is a tourist hotspot, but did you know that we're also a biodiversity hotspot? That's right! We're actually the epicenter of the North American Coastal Plain (NACP), which is 36th in the world, with The Florida Panhandle, home to rare coastal dune lakes and the Longleaf Pine ecosystem, being the 5th richest biodiverse spot in all of North America.

But what makes it a hotspot? The NACP has more than 1500 plant species not found anywhere else in the world and has lost more than 70% of its original surface area. In the Florida Panhandle, there are over 100 threatened or endangered species that live within the 57 different ecosystems in our area.

The key to conservation is the Florida Black Bear, known as an umbrella species. By focusing on the conservation of black bears and their habitats, we can also protect larger groups of species that share their home. "If you could pinpoint one animal specifically that essentially helps protect everything underneath it, the black bear is the largest most iconic species that we have here in the Florida Panhandle," said CoProducer Sean Couch in an interview with The 30A Company.

Many of you know someone who's encountered a black bear or has encountered one themselves. There's a lot of conversation around population control, food sources and why they're knocking down your trash can. However, most of it's not true. "There's so much misinformation about the black bear. The sooner we get rid of the misinformation, the better we can have an educated discussion about this," stated Arix in an interview with The 30A Company.

Black bears are actually selfregulating when it comes to their population. The gestation period for a female black bear is around seven months. However, there is a delayed implantation for the first five. The amount of food the female can find, or the amount of weight she can gain, will determine how many fertilized eggs will drop and develop into cubs.

Food sources are quite abundant within our forests. They eat around 73% plants, 22% insects and 5% meat. They'll feed on nuts, seeds, berries, beetles, grubs and saw palmetto. They don't like to chase their food if they don't have to, so sometimes road kill is on the menu. "Just because you see bears coming into your community and getting in your trash means nothing about their population," said Arix in the same interview. "Doesn't mean they can't find food. They're opportunistic and you've got good food."

So what should you do if you come face to face with a Florida Black Bear? Stay calm, and don't go towards it. Remember it's probably just as scared of you and you are scared of it. Most of the noises they make, we mistake for aggression. They may huff, click their teeth, stomp their feet or even false charge. However, they are just anxious and trying to let us know not to come closer because they are uncomfortable, too.

The Paper Bear Film switches from live action to animation as it hopes to shed more light on this species that is key to the survival of so many others. The premise is a coming-of-age story about a young boy and his father, who are working to track and research black bears in the Florida Panhandle, aiming to gain deeper insights into their behavior. Initially hesitant about the trip, the son undergoes a transformative journey as he develops his own understanding and appreciation for nature along the way. On a post from The Paper Bear's Instagram, Arix Zalace says, "It's a story you'll love, you'll laugh, you'll cry, and hopefully you'll want to protect when it's all said and done."

I'm proud to have our beautiful region highlighted on such a big stage for such an important reason. As The Paper Bear team works on finishing up the film, let's take a moment to consider our impact on the environment and the critical importance of our actions today, and how they shape our home for generations to come.

Freeport High School Students Explore Aquaponics

Freeport High School boasts an innovative aquaponics program that integrates culturing fish (aquaculture) and various crops (agriculture) using an array of growing systems, including deep-water well, nutrientfilm technique (NFT), Dutch buckets, and clay media beds. Spearheaded by the foresight of Walton County School District's Superintendent A. Russell Hughes and aided by a \$500,000 appropriations funding initiative from the Florida legislature in 2022, this program offers students a hands-on learning experience in sustainable agriculture, environmental stewardship, and equips students with invaluable career skills.

Students engage in the operation and maintenance of these aquaponic systems, learning



about the symbiotic relationship between fish, plants, and bacteria as they cultivate crops in water-efficient environments. The nutrient-rich water, which is created by fish, circulates through naturally occurring good bacteria systems that convert the fish waste to high nutrient water that then passes through various growing systems delivering essential nutrients to plants. The plants continue to filter the water so that it can then be returned to the fish. As students manage these systems, they learn to troubleshoot and overcome challenges that may arise in these aquaponic systems, developing critical thinking and problemsolving abilities essential for any profession.

Moreover, Freeport High School's aquaponics program hopes to extend its reach beyond the classroom by offering students the opportunity to participate in restoration efforts within our local estuary, Choctawhatchee Bay. By partnering with esteemed organizations such as the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, Mote Laboratory, and the Choctawhatchee Basin Alliance,



students can actively contribute to the preservation and enhancement of the Bay's ecosystem.

Through these unique partnerships, students gain firsthand experience in environmental conservation and scientific research, fostering a deeper understanding of the interconnectedness between human activities and the natural world. As they engage in restoration projects, students not only apply their knowledge in practical settings but also develop a sense of responsibility and stewardship towards their local environment, leaving a lasting impact on their community and beyond.

Moreover, the collaborative nature of the program fosters teamwork and communication skills as students work together to design, implement, and maintain their aquaponic setups. The program also cultivates leadership skills as students take on various roles and responsibilities within their teams. Whether leading project initiatives or mentoring peers, students learn to inspire and guide others, honing their leadership skills and achieving shared goals. These career-focused skills are integrated into the aquaponics program at Freeport High School not only to prepare students for success in fields related to agriculture, environmental science, and conservation but also to instill in them the confidence and competence to excel in any professional endeavor they pursue.

Path of Grace Ministry Thrift Store Is Open

A Florida Panhandle recovery program for women has reached a major milestone with the transformation of a former doctors' office building in Panama City to its third thrift store.

The Path of Grace Thrift Store is an 11,000-square-foot retail outlet featuring clothing, furniture and household goods, said store manager Brandee Anderson. It is located at 509 East 23rd Street in the

Home Depot shopping center. The store had a quiet launch last fall and is now fully operational.

The outlet sells products donated by supporters of the program, and its staff are women going through the twenty-four-month recovery program, she said.

The mission of Path of Grace is simple, Anderson explained: "This program is to restore mothers with their children, and to help them get back on their feet."

Founded fifteen years ago as a

faith-based organization to assist women trapped in alcoholism and drug abuse, Path of Grace has expanded significantly since then. The Panama City outlet is the third run by the organization, which also has two thrift stores in Miramar Beach at 10916 and 10962 US 98.

The recovery program itself is based in several Panhandle communities. Women accepted into the program live in three residential homes in Bonifay. A parallel residential program called Crown of





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Beauty opened there last year.

Those who successfully finish that phase of the program are eligible to stay in one of eight transition housing homes at Serenity Village located in Santa Rosa Beach.

"These 850-square-foot homes have been built to help single graduate mothers and children reunite, as well to help graduates who need a longer stay in a drug-free, protected environment," said Eddie Mansfield, managing director of Path of Grace.

Anderson said there currently are fifty-three women going through the recovery program, with another ten graduates living at Serenity Village.

Mansfield leads a staff of seven plus two therapists who guide the participants through their recovery.

While initially organized to serve Florida Panhandle residents - including Bay and Walton Counties - Path of Grace is open to women from anywhere if their situation matches the program services, Anderson said. "We've even had a person from Philadelphia go through," she said. Residents have ranged in age from eighteen (the minimum) to sixty.

Some participants have been referred to the program by the courts, while others have contacted Path of Grace directly seeking admission after learning about it from friends or family members, Anderson said.

All participants work at one of the Thrift Stores. Although they are not in salaried jobs, the residents receive monetary stipends to cover personal expenses. And upon successful completion, each graduate receives an \$8,100 check to begin the next phase of their life, she said.

Mansfield said he and his coworkers have been amazed at the program's success thus far. "It's so beautiful and rewarding to witness women going from down and out, in the gutter, with no self-esteem, to victorious and successful in every aspect of their lives," he said.

In addition to welcoming donations of furniture, clothing and household goods, Path of Grace as a nonprofit under IRS Section 501(c)3, welcomes direct financial donations, Anderson said. The store is also willing to pick up bulky or heavy objects like furniture at the donor's residence. Call (850) 654-8500 for furniture pickup.



Yellow Fly Season! Are You Ready?

Florida mosquitoes If weren't bad enough, yellow flies are here to steal their thunder.

These devilish insects will begin to arrive around mid-April and normally stick around for six weeks. They are quiet flyers and are hard to hear approaching. Once the female yellow fly decides you are the perfect meal,

she will gently land on you, and I am sure we are all very aware of what happens next. The female yellow fly is known as a fierce biter, and she will begin feeding on your blood by using her saw-like mouthparts to cut through the skin. I know it sounds horrible but just wait... there's more! Once the cut is made, she will begin to lacerate the skin with her two pairs of cutting "blades". This will allow the blood to flow out of the painful bite where she will then begin to "drink it up" with her sponge-like mouthparts. When this process is complete, the victim is left with a VERY painful welt which can take days and, worst case, weeks to go away.



You might be asking yourselves at this point, "Where are the male vellow flies?" Great question! The males are non-biters and keep busy as pollinators and nectar feeders. So surprisingly, male yellow flies help us out with their pollinating abilities.

Yellow flies are most active on cloudy days or in wet,

shaded areas near the edge of tree lines and avoid bright sunny, open areas unless they are extremely hungry. If you cannot avoid going outside, the best way to prevent bites is to stay covered. They are attracted to dark materials, so it is best to dress in bright clothing. Applying insect repellent containing DEET has had the best results.

Unfortunately, there does not seem to be an effective method to control populations, especially the larvae. Yellow fly kits can be used to reduce their presence in small areas or at least distract them from you but will not eliminate them. Beginning April 1, 2024, Yellow fly kits will be available only to South Walton Residents, (East County Line to West County Line and South of the Bay). One kit for your primary residence will be given out and proof of residency must be provided. 
Believe it or not, there is some good news when it comes to yellow flies! They do eventually disappear, and we can then turn our attention back to our dislike of mosquitoes!

The first quarter of 2024 is already behind us, and the markets have had some interesting results. The S&P 500 as of this writing was up over 10%; the Dow is up over 5%. Bonds, based upon the bellwether 10year U.S. Treasury have declined in price (which means they increased in yield) by about 2.5%. The stock market is made up of 11 sectors and every sector was positive except for real estate (which is mainly real estate investment trusts and real estate firms). Communication Services was the leader, with an almost 16% return (examples of stocks in that sector are Google, Facebook, Netflix, Disney, the phone companies such as ATT, Verizon and T Mobile among others). Technology, Industrials, Energy and Financials all had double digit returns for the quarter as well.

Oil prices were up over 13% and gold was up over 5%. The U.S. dollar, to the amazement of many was up over 2% after having a similar return for all of 2023. Japan was the leading international market with a re-

turn of over 11% year to date. A stronger dollar tends to work against international equities, but such was not the case for many international markets, Japan in particular.

Mortgage rates averaged close to 7% which is interesting because despite the perception that mortgage rates are quite high, that is less than the average rate for the past 50 years. Rates did reach an all-time low in the early 2020s. So, many understandably homebuvers have that concern. There has been so much liquidity (money available) for the past few years that it increased demand and thus prices substantially. The demand for housing, particularly first-time homebuyers continue to grow, and an outstanding question is if the current rate of construction is meeting the demand.

What about interest rates, particularly where the Federal Reserve is concerned? The Fed has held its short term (overnight rate) to 5.25-5.50% although pointed out in its March meeting that they foresee up to three rate cuts in 2024. Short term rates (one year or less CDs, money market mutual funds) continue to pay approximately 5%. By contrast the 10-year US Treasury pays approximately 4.25%. The longest-term U.S. Treasury pays approximately the same. The question on many minds is how long will the low to no risk rate be in favor? Enter the Federal Reserve dot plot, or where rates are expected to be and by when. Currently the dot plot puts the overnight rate at 4.5 to 4.75% by year end. It is much harder to ascertain what long term rates will do so watching the 10-year US Treasury (which many banks use to price mortgages and other loans) makes most sense to us. There is a lot in the financial media regarding the longer-term dot plot, perhaps as low as 3.5% by 2025 as noted on Bloomberg Wall Street Week this past week.

When the market has a strong return, particularly over an increasing period, many people begin to think about valuations. In other words, is the market getting more expensive relative to earnings. That seems to be the case as the price of stocks to earnings is near an all-time high. Earnings have been growing year over with the S&P averaging close to 12%. Its 10-year average earnings growth rate has been about 8.4%. Stocks typically follow earnings. What might be fueling that? There are several things: Innovations such as artificial intelligence (AI), the growth in energy demand, productivity gains, efficiency gains, a strong dollar and finally, the rate of inflation continued to decrease.

A few key points for investors bear repeating: Timing the market is next to impossible. They don't ring a bell at the top and they don't ring a bell at the bottom. FOMO, or fear of missing out can consume anyone but it is not an emotion that serves investors. Know what you own, why you own it, where you own it and for how long do you need or want to own it. Asset allocation should be based upon the three keys of investment objection, risk tolerance and time frame.



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

When did you last interact with a difficult person? Maybe the difficult person has anger problems, behaves with superiority, doesn't treat others the way they expect to be treated or is generally unkind, mean or rude. Sometimes you might label people as difficult when they have different values, opinions, religious views, political leanings or personalities than you.



While easy to overlook, sometimes you might be the difficult person. Self-awareness is a skill developed through uncomfortable practice. Noticing when you may tend towards being judgmental, short-fused, selfish or unkind can go a long way in helping you sort interactions with others. Noticing your capability of being difficult and your need for grace when you aren't your best self can inspire increased humility when address-

ing difficulty in others.

A common way to deal with difficult people is to become difficult yourself. When someone is rude, you may feel the invitation to match the rudeness. When someone is mean, you may spend time brainstorming ways to inflict vengeance. While these approaches can bring short term satisfaction and a false sense of justice, you end up giving up healthy emotional control and compromising your character. Over time, matching others' difficult behavior leads to bitterness, resentment, drama, shame and poor character habits. So, how do you address difficult behavior in healthy ways?

7 Ways to Navigate Interactions with Difficult People

1. Evaluate. Determine what is happening in a situation. What is bothering you and why? What is tough or feels like a boundary crossing?

2. Sort past emotion from present. Notice if something about this situation is bringing up feelings from past events/relationships that may be intensifying your emotions in the present. If so, take time to process past feelings separately to give you an accurate perspective in the current situation.

3. Sort differences from difficulty. Ask yourself if the other person is showing poor



character vs. has different opinions, values, perspective than you. Make space for difference. Address poor character.

4. Set boundaries. Use kind, direct words and tone to clearly state how the other party is crossing a boundary, how it impacts the relationship, what you will do differently and what you would like for them to do differently. "When you belittle me in front of others, I feel disrespected and emotionally unsafe in our relationship. I won't participate in conversations where I am belittled and disrespected. When talking to me, please use respect." If the other party respects your boundary and makes a change, that is an indicator of movement toward health. If the other party continues to cross boundaries or responds poorly to your boundary setting, that is information you need to understand the low value the other party places on the relationship.

5. Speak up for those whose voices are hard to hear. Sometimes difficult people

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cross boundaries resulting in negativity, abuse, or injustice for those who are vulnerable. Try using your voice and boundary setting for the sake of others.

6. Distance. Once a person has established an ongoing pattern of crossing boundaries and poor character they are unwilling to address, it's appropriate to create various forms of distance including limiting conversational topics, time, space, emotional energy/investment, and financial involvement. You have power to give your energy and resources to life-giving relationships and to withhold energy from life-draining relationships.

7. Disengage. Try practicing forgiveness toward difficult people for the sake of your own peace and character. Release your right to vengeance and let the relationship go. You have the power to discern when relationships need to end. Disengaging is not defeat. In fact, you win by sustaining good character and recapturing energy to invest in pursuits that bring positive meaning to your life and those around you.

Once you get into your SS account, there are two options, and this is where things can start to get complicated. The first option simply says, "Sign up for Medicare." There is a little blue box with an (APPLY ONLINE) option. Most people should select this and start the application. The second option says, "Sign up for Part B Only" and that blue box will say, "Get Started." This is for folks who already have their Part A or delayed enrolling in Medicare Part B because they stayed on an employer group plan past the age of 65.


Keep in mind that once your

application is complete, it will take 2-4 weeks before you receive your Medicare card. In the meantime, you'll want to learn about the various options you have for health and prescription coverage once you become a Medicare Beneficiary. 

Everyone was there, the whole gang. I saw them all. All my loved ones who died and left me behind. All my friends who met untimely ends. All my relatives who were called home too early. All my kin.

They were all right here, holding plates of hot food, mingling with one another. Everybody was smiling, throwing their heads back, laughing until they couldn't breathe.

I saw grandparents, deceased uncles, departed aunts, and cousins who died before they were old enough to know what life was about.

I saw multitudes of unfamiliar children, dancing while the musicians played "Turkey in the Straw." I asked an old woman nearby who all these children were.

"Those are the babies who died in the womb," the woman said. "Aren't they precious?"

We were interrupted when a large pack of dogs came running through the town, careening up Main Street. They came stampeding like a herd of bison. Among them, I saw six of my own dogs.

I saw Lady, the cocker spaniel who died in my arms when I was



a teenager. I saw Joe, who was hit by an SUV in a hit and run. I saw Boone, the collie-mix who died in a veterinary office while gazing into my eyes. I saw Ellie Mae, the bloodhound I'll never get over.

In a nearby park, I watched old friends play baseball. Mister Reginald was pitching—the retired Methodist minister who once lived on my street.

I saw my grandmother, standing at home plate, holding a hickory bat in her hands. Lord have mercy. She was a teenager, long and beautiful, with raven hair and Hershey's Kiss eyes.

After the ball game, I was hungry. So I found a paper plate and stood in line at one of the food tables. A guy in line said, "Sean! Don't you remember me?"

I stared at him, but didn't recognize his face.

"It's me!" he finally said. "James!"

"JAMES!" I screamed. James and I were friends as kids. He died driving home from his very first job. He wrecked his car on the interstate. I sat on the front row at his funeral and wept alongside his sisters.

Mid-hug, I saw someone else familiar. She was standing behind a food table, serving people. I knew those two fiery eyes, flecked with tinges of playfulness. It was my mother-in-law.

She was behind a crockpot, wielding a long spoon, wearing an apron that said "KISS ME, I'M METHODIST."

When she recognized me, she shouted my name and came running around the table to hug me. It was a colossal embrace that made my ribs squeak.

"You have no idea how much we all miss you back home," I told her.

Next, I saw Aunt Judith, Uncle Tommy Lee, the Williams boy, my old Little League coach, Cousin Elroy, Cousin Rose, Cousin Ray, and dear Mrs. Betty Lamb, who taught me in elementary school. I saw hundreds more familiar faces. Maybe thousands.

Then an old woman grabbed my arm and said, "There's one more person you need to meet, sweetie."

She led me to the edge of town, to a meandering river. There, on a shallow wooden bridge sat a young man, feet dangling over the edge, trousers rolled up to his knees. He was holding a long fishing rod like a grown-up version of Huck Finn. He saw me.

He stood.

My God, he was so young. He was so very young and so very lean. He had a mess of red hair atop his head, and his patent pending matinee smile was unchanged. He was wearing the same shirt he died in.

We embraced and I heard myself say his name. A word I've been waiting to use for a long time.

"Daddy."

I could smell his deodorant, a scent I haven't known in years. I could feel his lean trunk beneath my arms, and his beating heart only inches from my own.

"What is this wonderful place?" I asked my father. "Does it matter?" he said

"Yes, it matters. Because I don't ever want to leave."

He smiled. "Neither do any of us."

Then I woke up.

Finding a Common Language

I called my daughter-in-law a couple of days ago to wish her a


happy birthday. She shared that the weather where they live had been wildly variable as winter transitioned to spring. In fact, her daughter and my granddaughter had been pelted with what she

described as "dime-sized hail." Thinking quickly, or so I thought, I asked what kind of impression FDR had left on her. A

pression FDR had left on her. A moment of silence ensued, and I realized that what I considered a deft remark had likely only brought puzzlement.

In "Strawberry Fields," The Beatles' John Lennon sings "No one, I think is in my tree," which presents at least two interpretations. One is that Lennon has an intellect and imagination all to himself, which can lead to his being misunderstood. Another thought is that the words are essentially nonsensical and sung to stimulate thought about "meaning" when there really is none. The joke is then on those of us wanting elucidation when no logical explanation exists.

I recently had a conversation with a CODA. For those not familiar with the term, it refers to a



"child of a deaf adult." In 2021, a movie of the same name was released. It depicted a talented fully "hearing" young woman

who, as the only speaking member of her family, was cast in the role of mediating between her family's business in the fishing industry and custom-

ers. The tension revolves around the expectations of her parents to continue to be the communicative conduit for the business vs. seeking her own dreams as a musician and performer.

In considering that quandary, my friend offered a perspective I had not considered. As a product of a non-speaking environment, although she was fully capable of verbal communication, the first language she actually came to know was "signing." Now she often finds herself "threading the needle" between two different worlds: one where she seeks to articulate effectively among those with full audial function and another where she attempts to navigate the standards of signing. I had not considered that sign communication, like verbal, has its own unique patterns and dialects, just as in the speaking world. And that is just as it relates to English, not to

mention the plethora of world languages that adapt to signing.

So how do you know if you are connecting and finding common ground with others?

- 1. How much are you listening vs. speaking? Do you conscientiously apportion the time for each function? What would happen if you tried to limit your words to no more than 30% of the talking, using the approximate proportion of two ears and one mouth?
- 2. Where are your eyes focused? What might be distractive elements such as cell phones, large crowds, or background noise? Pocket the phone. Consider an alternative location to talk.
- 3. Does the other person appear engaged with you? If not, pause for a minute or change the pace. Check in. Ask, "Are we on the same page?"
- 4. Stop multitasking. Should not the person that is the present company be the most important consideration at that moment?
- 5. Ask questions. Let your curiosity be aroused. Again, slow down the pace of the conversation. Ensure that you're not coming across as "rushing" or hurrying the communication.
- 6. Repeat back what you've heard said. Summarize it. Verify that

you have heard accurately.

7. Thank the other person for the opportunity to dialogue. Using terms such as "Thank you for the privilege of your time," can connote honor and demonstrate a connection of esteem.

I appreciate the creatively and verbally gifted, those who are quick thinkers and geniuses at "turning a phrase." For all of us the challenge is to make sure that we first seek to share a common language with each other. Otherwise, it may not even be worth a dime.

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Dining **Crab Stuffed Avocado aka Galatoire's Crabmeat Maison**

I'm sharing one of my favorite New Orleans recipes adapted from my Galatoire's cookbook, which is one of my favorite New Orleans restaurants, called Crabmeat Maison.

Galatoire's is an iconic and

taurant nestled in the heart of the French Quarter. Its cuisine is anchored in French Creole traditions, which reflect the bounty of the region's seafood, poultry, game and spices.

Having moved to NOLA at the tail end of middle school and not officially departing until my second child was born, I have many fond memories of weekday martini lunches and special birthday dinners at Galatoire's and always look forward to a return visit.

I was sent a large gift box of avocados with four varieties from SoCal Avocados, which inspired me to make the Avocado Stuffed Crabmeat Maison (Crab Stuffed Avocado).

SoCal Avocados are grown on a small farm in California, ripen after they are picked from the tree, and each is hand-

picked to order. They are carefully packed, and shipping is free! I especially enjoyed a new favorite, the Fuerte.

Though I was familiar with Hass and my native Florida Avocados, It was fun to taste test the other varieties sent to me:

Bacon: Large body, smooth green skin, fruity and mild in flavor.

Fuerte: A smaller avocado in size, smooth, creamy and rich flavor. This was used in the Crabmeat Maison Recipe.

Pinkerton: Large body with rougher skin, and slightly fruity. I used this in my Great Guacamole.

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


Hass: Thick rough and dark skin, most commonly seen in markets, creamy and smooth.

Remove above to a mixing bowl, and mix together mayonnaise and maison dressing. Gently fold in the green onions, capers, parsley, salt and pepper.

Chill for two to four hours. Just before serving, gently fold in the lump crabmeat.

Slice the avocados in half, removing the outer shell and seed. Divide the lettuce ribbons among 6 serving plates spooning the crab on top of the avocado. Garnish with slice of tomato and wedge of lemon on the side.

door or shadows in the dark which drove our imaginations wild. As adults, some of us have different scary places: our bank balance, our retirement investments, our children going off to college, a friend or relative's health or not waking up to our alarms. We all have things or

places which can trouble us.

One space which causes some of us grief is a crawl space under our homes. Not all of us have these and they're not really scary. Merriam-Webster defines crawl space as: a shallow unfinished space beneath the first floor or under the roof of a building, especially for access to plumbing or wiring. These spaces are typically insulated with rolled insulation with some type of netting to keep the insulation from falling down. Some of us who have this type of insulation have witnessed our wild native friends: beach mice, squirrels, birds, and even geckos. Yes, geckos, the small chiefly tropical and nocturnal insectivorous lizards, also like this space and will rip the netting to gain access to the insulation and become non paying roommates under our homes.

At ECES, fixing crawl spaces was not always a service we provided, because there was not really a great solution other than spray foam or replace the rolled insulation and netting which would once again become a playground for our wild friends and would need replacing in a few years.

We believe in finding solutions which are highly energy efficient, healthy and will last the life of the home. A local Destin resident introduced us to a system which was a collaboration between LSU (Ag-Center), Forest Product Laboratory and Raised Floor Living. This system was a year study which took 12 homes and six different insulation systems after Hurricane Katrina. 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
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Covering Your Assets
